

> Power Boat Race. There were four entries in the power boat races: Roma, owned by E. T Hunt, Alexandria Bay; So Long, George Hasbrook, Alexandria Bay Teddy, Mr. Fry, Clayton; Radium, Peacock, Alexandria Bay. All were boats capable of running twenty-five miles an hour. The weather was unfavorable, however, there being a north wind, which made the harbor a hit rough for boats of the power variety. The result-was that the Teddy dropped out after the first round of five miles, having shipped much water and being unable to continue. The Roma quit after the second round, for the same reason. The start was made at 11.01 and the 80 Long covered the fifteen miles in forty-two minutes and thirty-five seconds, finishing at 11.43. good time considering the weather conditions. This boat was here for the Victoria day race, but met with an accident and had to drop out. Sh s about the fastest around the Thousand Islands. Her owner, Mr. Hasbrook, is a New Yorker. The Radium arrived seven minutes after the race tarted, but went after the others. She completed the course, but was only a good second.
