A STIRRING TIME

AN ENGLISH CAVALRY TROOP SABRE INFANTRY.

Mad Charge of Horsemen Upon Foot Guards Brigade at Aldershot Will Be Investigated by War Department.

London, Aug. 4.—An extraordinary incident occurred at Aldershot, which brought to an abrupt conclusion a scheme of field operations which was being carried on by the troops around Fox Hill.

The Foot Guards brigade, who were acting as rear guard to a force returning from the Hog's Back to the Fox Hills, had proceeded as far as Normandy common, when the cavalry brigade were ordered to charge them.

The cavalry, however, got out of hand, the charge was carried too far, and the dragons dashed among the guardsmen.

Some of the attacking force slashed right and left at the Guards' brigade with their sabres, and others, riding along the flanks, discharged their rifles at close quarters into the ranks.

The Guards dropped out of ranks as quickly as possible, and defended themselves with their rifles as best they could, but before the impetuous cavalrymen could be brought into order again, much injury and damage had been done.

Several of the guardsmen were severely injured by the flying wads from the blank cartridges, and had to be medically treated.

An officers horse was disabled by a sword cut, a cavalryman's leg was broken by a blow from a rifle delivered in self-defense by one of the Guards, and a guardsman saved his life by warding off a terrible cut at his head with a sword.

So fierce was this blow that the fore end of the guardsman's rifle was cut completely away.

The cavalry ran down the Guards' cyclists, injuring several, and smashed their machines by riding over them.

The affair, which at present seems inexplicable, caused a great sensation among the officers and men, some of whom will be unfit for duty for several weeks.

It is understood that an official inquiry will be held into the occurrence.

LADY MEDICO.

Kill Off Weddings and Restrict Marriages.

Portland, Aug. 4.—Ella K. Dearborn, a young woman doctor, improved on Dr. Oler at the regular meeting of the Homeopathic Medical Society for Oregon by recommending the chloroforming of all the unfit of whatever age and suggesting a refusal of a permit to marry to any but the physically perfect.

To accomplish the latter result she would have a state medical examiner decide whether both man and woman were in the best physical condition to marry.

In an answer which was made by Dr. George Wigg, the latter said such matters would better be left to moral education. Dr. Dearborn said in part:

"Under existing laws there is no way of weeding out contaminated subjects and so they marry, and it is their progeny that fills our public institutions for criminals and the insane. Tradition, sentiment and conventionality stand in the way of scientific progress.

"There are many people in the world who are not criminals at all, but generate or invade, but who are not fitted to beget children. These persons should not be allowed to beget children. Let those of the highest mental and physical attainment do the child-bearing—let the non-bearing population contribute toward the support and education of the well-born children."

Very Latest Called From All Over the World.

The new jail at Edmonton will be made a penitentiary.

The estate of Cassie Chadwick will pay seven mills on the dollar.

Twenty Hamilton lithographers went on strike, chiefly for recognition of the union.

The German emperor is credited with seeking to secure the neutralization of Denmark.

Lord Roberts is not coming to Canada owing to the poor health of Lady Roberts.

The men charged with complicity in the whitecaping of Thomas Dalmage, at Wheatley, were acquitted.

For selling liquor in the local option township of Darlington, Ont., J. Gallagher was fined \$100 and costs.

Mayor Belcher, Paterson, N.J., has been missing all week and the civic employees are without salaries.

Bishop E. K. Hargrove, of the Methodist Episcopal church, is dead at Nashville, Tenn., aged seventy-six years.

The Japanese civil administration still will leave Tokio for the Island of Saghalien, August 6th, and establish headquarters at Alexandrovsk.

The czar is unable to sleep and has suffered several painful attacks of heart trouble. He has become much thinner as a result of poor health.

The supreme court of the I. O. F., at Atlantic City, endorsed a plan for the settlement of large tracts in the North-West by members of the order.

A discovery of cobalt has been made near Massey, Ont., on the Whiskey Lake Copper property of John A. Montague, of Sault Ste. Marie. The formation is the same as in the Temiskaming cobalt fields.

The sale by auction was conducted at Portsmouth, England, of twenty-three battleships condemned by the admiralty. The highest figure obtained was £10,000, for the cruiser Orford, 5,600 tons, and the lowest £1,400, for the gunboat Fancy, 284 tons.
