



Effective Sunday Law. Mr. Paterson, K.C., has been look-Sunday law which is as good as anything the Sunday observance people can desire. This law is chapter under the provisions of the British North America Act, because it is clared that all laws of the province were to remain in force until repealed by competent authority.

The things forbidden by this old law are buying or selling on Sunday, doing any business or work, (conveying travellers, selling drugs or medicines and works of charity and necessity excepted); holding public or political meetings, tippling in any inn, tavern or grocery, revelling, brawling, and sing profane language. Hunting and fishing, as amusements are prohibited. So are games, such as skittles, ball, football, and racket; also races of any sort, on foot, on horseback, or

in carriages and vehicles, All the foregoing provisions contained in the pre-confederation at and now in force were re-enacted the Ontario statute. The only alteration has been the wiping out of clauses prohibiting Sunday excursions and Sunday street cars. The penalty which may be imposed for violation of the act now in force is a fine varying from \$1 to \$40, and in default of payimprisonment up to three months.
