A BIG BATTLE

Will Be On Scale Of Great Magnitude.

ASTONISH THE WORLD

UNLESS CALLED OFF BY PEACE TERMS.

Attempt on Passes Checked—Japanese Ships Seen About Vladivostok—Linevitch is to Fight on the Defensive to Wear Out the Enemy.

London, Aug. 5.—The Moji, Japan, correspondent of the Telegraph, quotes an expert who has just arrived there as saying that the coming battle in Manchuria will be on a scale of such magnitude that it will astonish the whole world. Unless peace is previously concluded, it will decide the war once for all. Gen. Linevitch's front extends 300 miles in Manchuria alone, and reaches, besides, to the Tumen and Amur river and to Vladivostok.

Advance Checked.

Godzavolani, Manchuria, Aug. 5.—Despatches received from Korea report that the Japanese began a simultaneous advance from Kuanhsodorin, against the Musari and Piatshang passes, but that both columns were checked under pressure of the Russian advance detachments. The Russian losses, the despatches say, were insignificant.

Japan warships are reported to be cruising off the mouth of the Great Bay, on which Vladivostok is situated, their lights often being visible from Russian islands.

EARLY CONFLICT.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 5.—It is stated that the advance guards of the Japanese and Russian armies, south of the Tumen river, are within rifle range of one another. An early conflict is inevitable.

Almost tropical rains are falling in Manchuria, and important operations apparently will be impossible for a long time to come.

Will Be In Defence.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 5.—Gen. Linevitch has abandoned the idea of assuming the offensive, and has completed arrangements for a stubborn defensive, possibly fighting a retrograde campaign, and utilizing the positions he has already prepared by falling back on them. He has telegraphed that he is content that he can wear out the enemy.

CHINESE WIN LEGAL FIGHT.

Railway Worsted in Suit Over Collision at Sea.

London, Aug. 5.—The privy council has refused the C.P.R. owners of the Empress of India, leave to appeal in their suit against the Chinese government. The application was dismissed with costs.

The case arose over a collision between the Empress of India and a Chinese cruiser, while the latter was endeavoring to arrest a couple of reformers supposed to be on the former. Each vessel held the other responsible for the damage. The C. P. R. sued to recover damages in the Chinese consular court, but lost. The case was carried to the privy council, where the steamship company has again lost.

Manzer Collapsed.

Oswego, N.Y., Aug. 5.—Manzer, the convicted murderer of twelve-year-old Cora Sweet, broke down at the county jail and wept like a child. Mr. and Mrs. Gurney, with whom he worked at the time of the commission of the crime, came to bid him good-bye, and they left him with the words: "Good-bye, Henry; we shall never see you again." He for the first time seemed to realize the full significance of his position, and after the most remarkable example of composure that has ever been known in the criminal annals of the county he sobbed and wept bitterly.

Manzer was sentenced to be electrocuted in Auburn prison, the week of September 10th.

Divorce For The Kaid.

London, Aug. 5.—Kaid Sir Harry Maclean, commander of the forces of the Sultan of Morocco, has won his divorce suit. It took the special jury hearing the suit just an hour of retirement to decide that the charges which he had brought against his wife, Lady Maclean, and the co-respondent, Spencer Mortimer, formerly of the Gibraltar garrison, were proved.

Alfonso's Hair Dying.

San Sebastian, Spain, Aug. 5.—King Alfonso visited the infant Fernando, heir apparent to the Spanish throne, whose condition is considered hopeless. He had another attack of meningitis and the infant Isabel was hastily summoned to the child's bedside.

Girl Burns To Death.

Watertown, N.Y., Aug. 5.—Florence Tiff, two years old, daughter of Truman Tiff, a Lewis county farmer, was burned to death while playing with matches in a hay pile.

THE DUKE'S BIRTHDAY.

He Has Just Reached His Sixtieth Year.

London, Aug. 5.—In view of the youthful appearance and active life of the Duke of Argyll, husband of Princess Louise of Wales, it is difficult for even his intimate acquaintances to realize that he has reached his sixtieth year. Such is the case, however, his grace having been born at Stafford House, August 6th, 1845, and will consequently celebrate his sixtieth birthday to-morrow.

The Duke of Argyll is keeper of the great seal of Scotland and hereditary master of the royal household in the northern kingdom, and is also chief of the clan Campbell. Since the death of his father four years ago, the duke has not occupied the ancestral castle at Inverary, but spends his time mostly at Windsor Castle, of which he has been governor and constable since 1892, and at his London residence, Kensington Palace.

EASY MONEY

Is What The Grafters Are After.

THEIR PARADISE

"TWO SUCKERS BORN A MINUTE IN NEW YORK."

Avare of the Unsophisticated Makes Them the Natural Prey of the Confidence Artist, Who Considers His Calling Legitimate.

New York, Aug. 5.—John S. Strosider, hunko steerer, confidence man, card sharp and wire tapper, gives the most extraordinary statement published of recent years. He has cast aside the veil of mystery with which the predatory brotherhood cloak their operations and reveals the methods by which he has gained more than \$100,000 without giving a thing of value for it. "There is a sucker born every minute—except in New York, where the birth rate is one every thirty seconds," is the sardonic key-note to the whole of the Strosider philosophy.

"I have never revealed my operations to the public before," said Mr. Strosider, "but that is not because I have been afraid to do so. I have been within the law with my operations, and knowing that I was within the law, I did not hesitate to give my true version of the fleeing of Dr. Harris to the district attorney. That was a case of 'Come on, whisker,' and I 'trimmed' him at faro of \$12,500 that he later confessed belonged to his wife and himself on a joint account.

"I am a gambler, and in ten years past I have been known as a gambler, but because I admit the fact there is no reason for anyone to think that I did not consider myself in the same class as the Wall street crowd that seek to gain sudden riches with the least use of money or to go higher up to the 'giants of finance' that swing their deals and manipulations through the use of the money of widows and orphans. I went deliberately into this game of confidence largely on a sporting basis. When I became old enough to size up the general situation I observed that there were a large number of persons of the Dr. Harris stripe who were on the lookout to obtain something for nothing. I considered myself keen enough to dole out my wits with men of this ilk, and I have succeeded. It has been a case of 'drop eat dog,' and I have never dropped my boys. I have been out to 'trim' my fellow man, and often times he has imagined he was 'trimming' me or someone else through my assistance, and that was where he lost out on the proposition. No man duped by myself or other men on the outlook for other people's money through the practice of my particular specialty would have been so mulcted unless he had larceny in his thoughts. No man would ever attempt to win through the tapping of a wire through a crooked faro bank, or roulette wheel or by any of the other methods connected to win the gold from the avaricious unless he were consumed with a desire to get large returns on a minimum of capital.

"I have secured fortunes through such practices and lost them by being a 'sucker' at playing the races or the faro bank myself, but no man who has ever earnestly endeavored to win through the tapping of a wire through a crooked faro bank, or roulette wheel or by any of the other methods connected to win the gold from the avaricious unless he were consumed with a desire to get large returns on a minimum of capital.

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RUG AS PARACHUTE.

Enfolds Her as She Falls from Fifth Story.

New York, Aug. 5.—A rug which formed a parachute saved the life of Mrs. Kate Getin, yesterday, in a fall from the fifth floor of a Cherry Hill tenement to a cement paved yard. Her right arm was broken. She fell out of a back window into a steep, narrow alley crossed by clothes lines. The woman living in the ground floor had heard a thud on the pavement and saw the corners of a large rug folding over Mrs. Getin, who lay in its center.

Swaying of the clothes lines above showed that Mrs. Getin had taken a clean drop from the fifth to the third floor without striking an obstruction until she hit a rug which lay spread over two clothes lines.

From that point downward the edges and corners of the rug had flapped against the clothes lines sufficiently to retard the plunge of the woman in the middle of the big carpet.

GORED TO DEATH BY STAG.

Terrible Death of a Farmer Near Ogdensburg.

Ogdensburg, N. Y., Aug. 5.—Word has reached here from Woodstock that Joseph K. Hat, a farmer, aged sixty years, was killed by a stag. Mr. Hat lived on the Bridgewater road, and went after the cows as usual. The cows, accompanied by a stag, came home. As Mr. Hat's was not with them, his son, Harry, went to look for him. He found his father's body lying in the road, terribly gored and mangled, especially about the neck. The animal had been vicious for some time, and Mr. Hat carried a heavy club to defend himself. The stag was found in the road near the body.

BOILERS FOUND WEAK.

Verdict of Bennington Court of Inquiry.

San Francisco, Aug. 5.—A special despatch to the Call from San Diego, says: From an official source the reliability of which cannot be questioned because of its connection with the court itself, it has just become known what in substance will be the report of the court of inquiry now investigating the Bennington disaster.

It may be stated authoritatively that the court will find that boiler B of the Bennington exploded not because of unusually high pressure but because the metal of the crown sheet and the bolts holding that crown sheet in place had become "dead," and lost all life and nearly all tensile strength by reason of constant use and the failure to renew the weakened place during the twenty years that the ill-fated Bennington was in service.

The court will not censure the officers of the Bennington, but will pass up the matter and the responsibility to higher authority.

WILL BE A REPUBLIC.

Favors Acceptance by Prince Charles of Denmark.

Copenhagen, Aug. 5.—Since his arrival at the Danish court, Emperor William appears to have become convinced that there is no hope of a prince of the house of Bernadotte being named King of Norway. His Majesty now favors Prince Charles of Denmark and he is quoted as saying:

"If Prince Charles does not become king, Norway will be a republic. If king, I prefer a monarchy and therefore shall hereafter support the candidacy of Prince Charles."

UNDER REVIEW.

Can Taxes Be Paid to Another Municipality?

Slated For Retirement.

Ottawa, Aug. 5.—Men in touch with government doings say that the superannuation of William G. Parmelee is likely to take place in the near future. Mr. Parmelee has been deputy minister of trade and commerce for over twelve years, and has also been in the public service thirty-two years. He is now seventy-two. P. C. O'Hara is mentioned as a possible successor. He has acted efficiently on all occasions in the absence of the deputy head. His chief official position is superintendent of commercial agencies, a branch which has reached an important status according to British and United States authority, under his supervision. Mr. O'Hara is next in rank to the deputy minister, being a chief clerk in the department. The civil service list gives the date of his first appointment to the service as 1897. He was born in 1870 at Chatham, Ont., and divided his early life between newspaper work and the banking business.

Homestead Entries Grow.

Ottawa, Aug. 5.—The homestead entries for July show an increase of 790 over July, 1904. The entries for the past month were 3,729, against 3,019 for July last year. The largest increase was at Regina, where the number rose from 743 to 1,110. Battleford came next with 622 against 277 in July, 1904. There was an increase at Alameda of 104, of 56 at Calgary, 148 at Red Deer. There were decreases at Yorkton, Lethbridge and Edmonton. The entries for the month of July, 1904, were 2,236 entries. The year promises to be a record breaker.


