His father, the late Edward John Barker, M.D., editor and publisher, after taking his diploma in medicine in England, came to Canada, in 1833, and settled in Kingston, where for a time he was employed as editor of the Spectator. His pungent and powerful Mr. and Mrs. James Spence, of The style attracted the attention of leading men of Upper Canada, who induced him to start The British Whig in 1834, which became the most influential journal in old Canada, long before the Globe or any other present papers were in existence. Dr. Barker, while a Baldwin reformer, became, like many others, proud of Sir John A. Macdonald's abilities, and became his supporter, defender, and warm


