Dublin, Aug. 11 .- An Irish family named O'Keefe have proved to their own satisfaction that the Emerald isle legend of "rich relatives in America" is sometimes founded on fact. A fortune of \$11,500,000 is fact enough for any legend. This is what the O'Keeles claimed and have obtained.

In 1804 Dennis O'Keefe of Kilkee, County Clare, left his frish home and shipped as a sailor, wandered over the world, went through many thrilling adventures, and finally decided to settle in Texas on a tract of land which he bought for a mere song.

Many years after his death oil was discovered there, and from almost worthless land it sprang into property of priceless value. Search was made for O'Keefe's rela-

tives, but it was not until a few months ago that a lawyer named Hildreth discovered a relative in Mrs. Maria O'Keefe Fennell. Mrs. Fennell immediately notified
