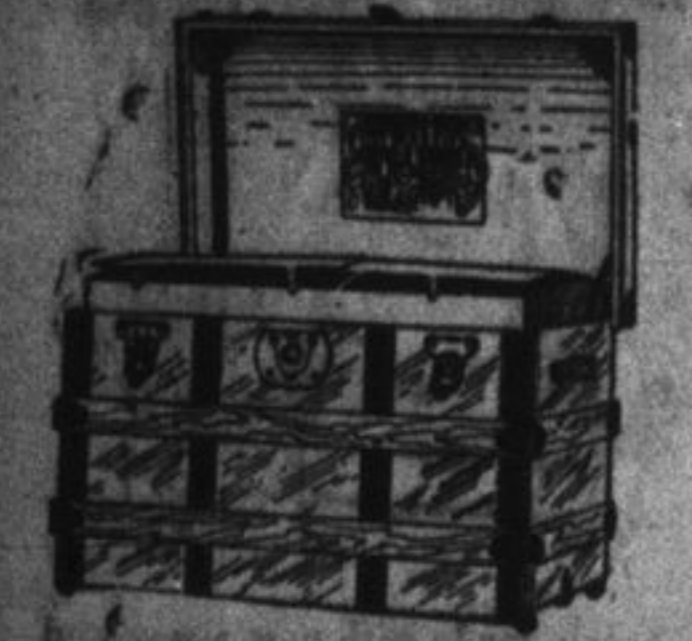

KING BRINGS CHEER

FOUR HUNDRED OLD WAR-VETERANS ENTERTAINED.

Declare They Had Time of Their Lives After Drinking Ale and Eating Pies and Puddings With "Real Silver Knives and Forks."

London, Aug. 16.—Happiness complete and supreme is realized by few, but there are to-day at Chelsea 400 veterans who exultingly claim that they have drained the cup of happiness to the dregs.

Yesterday was the greatest day in their eventful lives, and it will for scores of years stand out like a beacon light in the history of Chelsea hospital. For upon that day the war-veterans, resplendent in their scarlet frocks and full dress coats, spent three hours at Chelsea 400 at Buckingham Palace.

At the present the old men feel that they cannot describe it with justice. The excitement and glamour are still too great.

"It was as good as a dinner as the king could have himself," declared one old soldier who even then felt that his description was inadequate.

"Smoking in silence, the old men stood about in the hospital grounds yesterday evening thinking of the events of the great day of their lives."

Every man who took a foot to the ground polished his buttons and medals yesterday morning, and removed every speck of dust from his long scarlet coat and his three-cornered hat.

A score of boys took the men to the palace—"middle aged" men of ninety-two "boys" of sixty-four, veterans with one arm or one leg—each as happy as a child.

In open order the veterans stood facing the west door of the palace, from which the king and queen emerged, accompanied by the Prince of Wales, Princess Victoria, the Duke and Duchess of Sparta, Prince Arthur of Connaught, Princess Frederick Charles of Hesse, Sir George White (governor general), and others.

The scene was a charming but touching one. The old were again young. Pleasure was marked on the king's face as he looked at each of them individually, asking questions concerning their services and decorations, commiserating with the invalids, and generally displaying keen interest in their past.

"Three cheers for the king!" called Sir George White, and the inspection over, 400 voices, grand and cracked, raised and 400 three-cornered hats were waved.

"Three cheers for the queen!" And again the roar of voices.

At the close of the inspection the king addressed the pensioners in these terms: "I am glad to see you all here to-day, and I thank you for coming down to see us. You have a new governor and a new lieutenant-governor, and I trust they will look well after you as long as you live. May that be very long."

As the veterans were about to repeat their demonstration the king called out: "Was a minute?" Glancing at the army list, his majesty remarked to Quartermaster-Sergeant Organ: "I see you are one of the oldest quartermaster sergeants in the army. Take this and wear it in memory of this occasion. He then gave him the Victorian medal."

The old boys hobbled away, with a score of neatly dressed nurses, to the refreshment tents, where they were lavishly visited by their majesties.

The queen joined among them, speaking to one and another and sympathizing with their ailments, and many an old veteran was made happy for life by having food passed to him by her majesty.

As a souvenir of their ever to be remembered visit the king presented to each pensioner a briar pipe with the royal cipher stamped upon it. The gift was accompanied in each case by a quarter of a pound of tobacco.

CONSCIOUS THOUGH HANGED. Pastor Tells of Experiment Made With Murderer.

New York, Aug. 17.—According to the World the Rev. E. A. Meury, pastor of the Second Reformed church in Jersey City, made the statement, yesterday, that he had hanged five others a murderer proved while being executed on the gallows that he retained consciousness, memory and the power of voluntary motion after his neck was broken.

KILLS HER CHILD

THEN DRINKS ACID AND DIES IN HIS ARMS.

Wife Drowns Her Baby in a Bath—Husband Ill With Typhoid Fever When She Shot Him—Man Will Recover.

New Albany, Ind., Aug. 16.—Calmly and without apparent reason, Mrs. Emma Winstandley, wife of Chester Winstandley, one of the most prominent men of this town, drowned her daughter, Ruth, eight years old, in a bath tub to-day, then fired a bullet into her husband's body and finally ended her own life by swallowing the contents of an eight-ounce bottle of carbolic acid. So deliberately did the woman go about her deadly work that she planned yesterday when Mrs. Winstandley bought the pistol with which she shot her husband and the carbolic acid with which she killed herself.

The tragedy apparently had been planned yesterday when Mrs. Winstandley bought the pistol with which she shot her husband and the carbolic acid with which she killed herself. About three o'clock this afternoon she was ready to carry out her plans. She took her eight-year-old daughter, Ruth, to the bath tub, and then calling to the little girl undressed her, took her into the bathroom and remained there about twenty minutes.

When Mrs. Winstandley came out she showed no signs of nervousness or agitation. She walked over to the bed in which her husband was lying ill with typhoid fever and, sitting on the edge, she gently stroked his forehead.

"Where's your heart, dear?" she asked her husband. Winstandley put his hand over his heart. The wife drew it away and put her own there affectionately. While she kept the one hand over her husband's heart she drew from the folds of her dress the pistol. This she slipped under the sheet and as the muzzle pressed against his breast she fired.

"The husband, despite his illness and his wound, sprang out of bed and started after his wife. She ran into her room and locked the door. Her mother, who had heard the noise of the shot, also ran upstairs, and husband and mother arranged the woman to open the door. With the same self-control she had displayed on the edge of the bed she parleyed with the couple, but refused to open the door. Finally the husband became so weak that he sank to the floor. The wife heard him fall and asked:

"Mother, is he dead?" "I don't know," the mother replied. "Open the door and see."

"Oh I guess not," Mrs. Winstandley shouted, and she sat on the floor. The mother carried the husband to his room and placed him in bed, where he regained consciousness. Curiosity also got the better of the wife, and she opened the door of her room. Not seeing her husband on the floor, she walked to his room. As she entered she swallowed the carbolic acid, and threw herself on his bed. She died in his arms several minutes later.

The death of her daughter and the wounding of her son-in-law had not moved the mother, and no thought was given to little Ruth. The mother rushed out of the house screaming for help, and several men responded. They found the husband vainly trying to arouse his wife, apparently oblivious to his own wound. He also asked them to find Ruth.

The father called to the girl, but she did not respond. Then Winstandley remembered that his wife had taken the girl to the bathroom, and he asked the men to look in there. They found the girl's body in the tub.

The mother's anger had taken the girl into the room, placed her in the tub and held her head under water until she died. The husband swooned when the news of his daughter's death was sent for. As he removed the bed sheet he saw bloodstains and found that Winstandley had been shot. The bullet had entered the body near the breast, but made only a superficial wound. Despite the wound and his illness, it was said he probably would recover.

Both Had An Appendix. The most curious happening which has come to the notice of the Connecticut State Board of Health, is that the other day, "was a little detail in a church service. In July, 1902, King Edward's coronation had been postponed because of his illness, and then came the operation, and then the service of rejoicing over his recovery. I attended one of these, and the clergyman in charge, announcing the hymn 'From the choiced, make us, O Lord, sing, 'Peace, Perfect Peace,' in the appendix. As the congregation was English, few noticed the joke."
