COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.
The Ogilvie Flour Mills Co. place the western wheat crop at \$2,900,000 bushels. U. S. H. earnings for the second week in August increased \$53,000 over same week in 1904.

The historic firm of John Burman & Sons, Dundas, is reported to have entered a merger of four American and several Canadian machine shops.

The salmon catch in the Fraser River, British Columbia, is so phenomenal that the tanneries are too excited with the fish to be disposed of fast enough. The factories are running night and day.

Wm. Lyall, of P. Lyall & Sons, "bar" structure of Montreal, purchased a Main Street, Dundas, building near the C. N. terminal for \$150,000. He contemplates erecting a ten-story hotel costing \$750,000.

A dispatch from Medicine Hat says that a movement is on foot to establish a lashed oil factory at that point, and to combine therewith an equipment for utilizing the fax straw in manufacture of binder twine. Flax yields a remarkable crop in that locality.

Twin City has purchased the property known as Big Island, in Lake Minnetonka, twenty miles from Minneapolis. The property will probably be re-arranged as "Coney Island," and the company will construct on a smaller scale an amusement centre on the plan of the big New York resort.

Los Angeles, Cal., estimates of the citrus crop for next year indicates a record breaker. That there will be upwards of 35,000 carloads is certain, and the aggregate may reach 40,000 cars. Harvesting for this season shows that the southern California fruit acreage will have distributed \$7,000,000 to growers of fruit shipped for its money. Close calculations upon the output for next season place the net amount that will come to the growers at about \$12,000,000.

A NEW BUILDING TO BE REARED FOR GOVERNMENT USES.

The Option on Wellington Street Will Likely Be Taken Up—Some of the Recent Appointments of the Government.

Ottawa, Aug. 19.—The Canada Gazette, to-day contains the following notices of appointments:

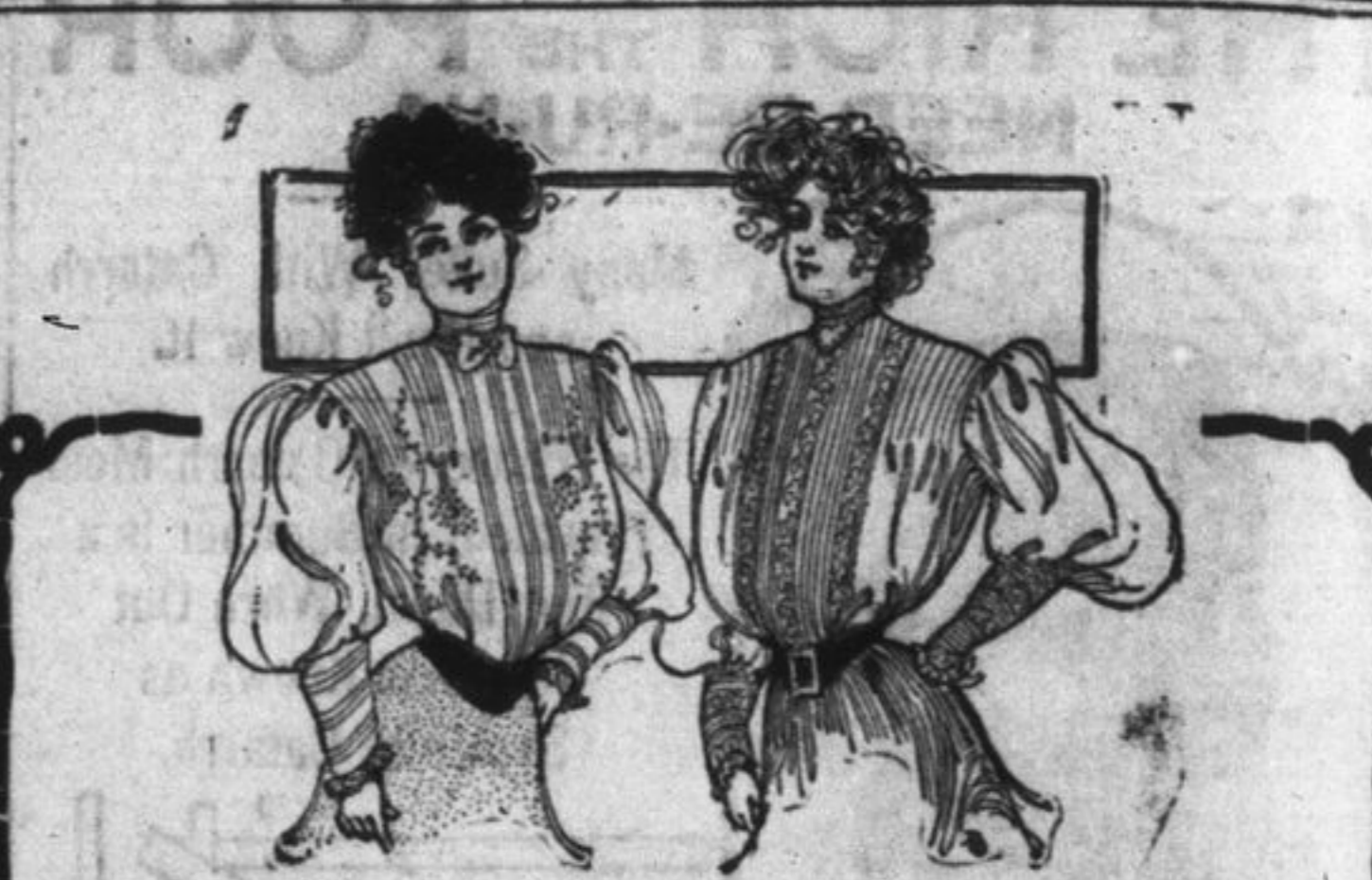

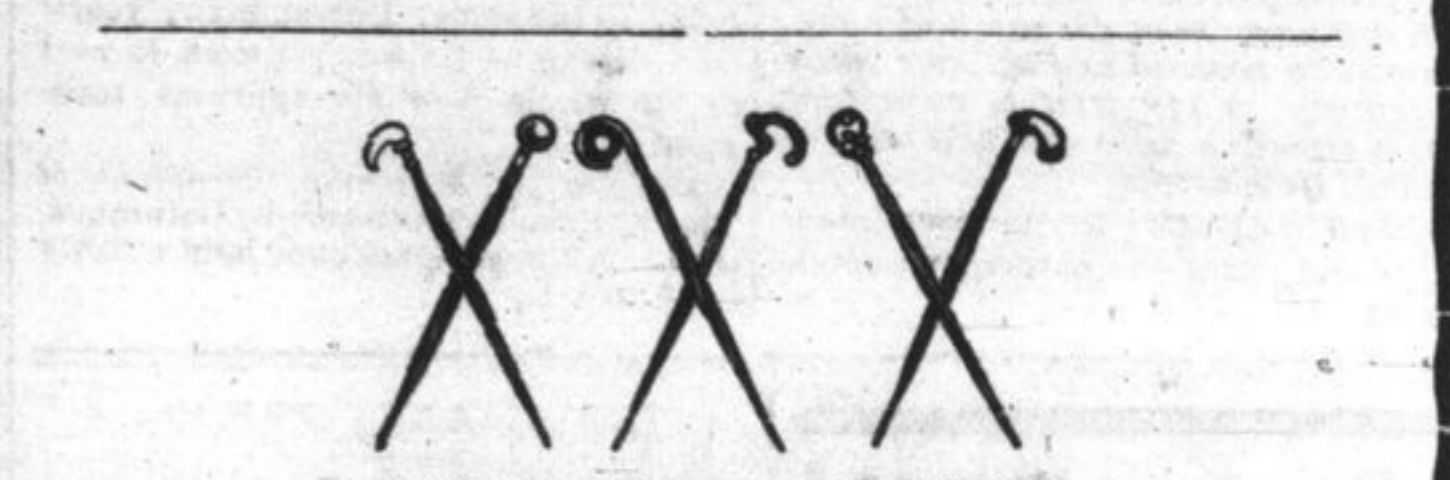

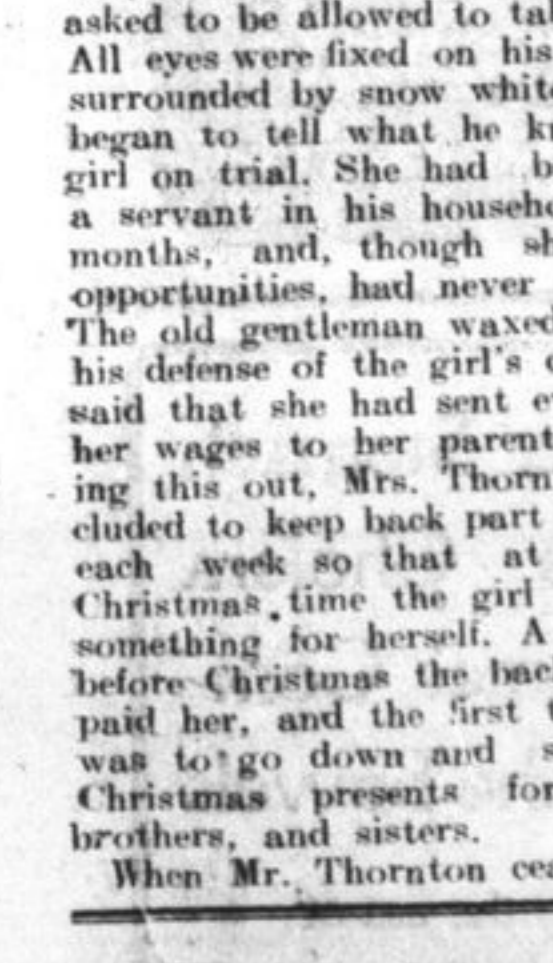
