(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of any person who is alignible to make der the provisions of this Act, resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a home-stead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with b father or mother.

(8) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the APPLICATION FOR PATENT should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector. Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS. Coal.-Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can he acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents er ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected Quartz.—A free miner's certificate granted upon payment in advance of \$7.50 per annum for an individual, and rom \$50 to \$100 per annum for a com-

A free minor, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,500x The fee for recording a claim is \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may, mean having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 an acre.

The patent provides for the payment of a royalty of 2½ per cent on the sales.

PLACER mining claims generally are 100 feet square; entry fee \$5, renewable yearly.

A free miner may obtain two leases to dredge for gold of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior. The lessee shall have a dredge in operation within one season from the date of the lease for each five miles. Rental, \$16 per annum for each mile of river leased. Royalty at the rate of 2½ per cent collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.
