CAPTAIN SUSPENDED FOR RUNNING THE ARGYLE AT FULL SPEED.

During Fog When Recent Casualty Occurred - Judgment Given by Commander Spain and Capt. Thomas Donnelly.

In the city council chamber at 10:30 o'clock Saturday morning judgment was given in connection with the recent casualty to the steamer Argyle. In attendance were Commander Spain, who read the judgment, Capt. Thomas Donnelly, John Hazlett, manager of the Lake Ontario Navigation Company, and press representatives. The judgment was as follows:

"In the matter of a formal investigation, held at Kingston, Ont., on Wednesday, 9th August, 1905, before Commander O. G. V. Spain, R.N., wreck commissioner, assisted by Capt. Thomas Donnelly, to enquire into the causes which led to the grounding of the British S.S. Argyle, of Corbett's Point, near Oshawa, Ont., on Saturday, 29th July.

"The court having carefully enquired into the circumstances, attending the above mentioned shipping casualty, finds as follows: "That the S.S. Argyle, of the port of Picton, Ont., left Toronto at 8:20 a.m. on Saturday, 29th July, bound for Oshawa, with an excursion party of 150 passengers on board, belonging to the Toronto Carpet Company."

"That the weather was foggy from the time the Argyle left the wharf until she struck. "The Argyle was commanded by Capt. William Manson, who holds a certificate of competency for the inland waters, issued in Toronto, in March, 1885."

"From the sworn evidence given during the enquiry by the inspector of hulls, the equipment of the inland water, issued in Toronto, in March, 1885."

"The mate in his evidence testified that the Argyle had been carried on board the ship, and once a week, the steering gear on board the vessel was in good order, and no complaints were made about it."

"The compasses on board the Argyle were not correct, and the captain had no correct idea of the deviation; and so far as the court was able to ascertain, the compasses had not been corrected clearly and accurately."

WORK OF SWINDLERS

DISAPPEARANCE OF BAGGAGE EXPLAINED. Arrest on Charge of Stealing Furs Reveals Other Operations - Clever Scheme Revealed by Arrests.

Chicago, Aug. 26.-The Inter-Ocean says: The mysterious disappearance of hundreds of trunks and other baggage from the railway trains and stations in Chicago, St. Louis and Denver, during the past two years, has just been revealed through the arrest here of Roy Aldrich, alias Roy Espey of California, and a woman, giving the name of Daisy Dehn and her home as Denver.

They were arrested on a charge of stealing furs from a store in the Masonic Temple. When their rooms were searched the police found a large number of articles of clothing, and a profusion of the most expensive clothing and toilet articles for men and women.

Miss Dehn confessed to the police yesterday her participation in a scheme which caused a large number of trunks to lose a vast amount of valuable baggage.

The scheme was simple. They would take a trunk, satchel, or suit case containing only a shirt or some other article of clothing, and check it to some nearby point.

After the trunk was placed in the baggage car either the man or woman would go to baggage agent, hand him half a dollar, show the check, and ask to be allowed to open the trunk or satchel in order to get out a clean shirt or some other article.

In not a single case did the baggage-master refuse the request. While ostensibly getting something out of one trunk to wear the man or woman would exchange the check on the empty trunk for a value in the car.

When the trunk reached the destination to which the dummy baggage had been shipped, Aldrich would immediately present the duplicate of the check which he had transferred to another trunk, get it and take it to his room. When the owner of the article called for it he would be offered the dummy trunk of the sharpers.

Detectives of the railroads are now trying to trace the stolen property. The bean woman admits that much of it has been stored in various places, but so far she has refused to reveal where.

Wanted to a Shadow, But Still Continues to Live. Yonkers, N.Y., Aug. 26.-After 138 days in a state of coma, the condition of Charles Canopi, aged eight, is today practically unchanged. The boy has lost weight until he is now but a mere shadow.

On April 8th he was attacked with a pain in his head, and two hours later was unconscious. The doctors diagnosed the case as one of cerebro spinal meningitis. From that day to now he has never moved a muscle, lying in a trance-like state, with eyes closed. His diet consists of milk and raw eggs, administered to him in a spoon.
