TARTARS AND ARMENIANS Fight in Baku—Killed Number One Hundred. Special to the Whig. St. Petersburg, Sept. 5.—Advice from Baku indicate that the regular battle is proceeding between Tartars and Armenians, and the killed and wounded, up to Sunday, numbered a hundred. Among the wounded is Prince Nisnerzade. The fighting commenced yesterday, and the conflict became more desperate than it was before. The Tartars are attacking the troops.

BUBBLE BURST To Czar Alone Belongs Diplomatic Victory. WANTED MORE WAR DID NOT BELIEVE JAPAN WOULD ACCEPT TERMS. Reprached M. Witte for Allowing the Partition of Saghallen—Ranks Deep in the Breast of the Imperial Head. Special to the Whig. London, Sept. 5.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times cables: "Some of the inner secrets are coming to light, and a statement is made on excellent authority to-day that goes far to settle some of the main questions. Information given me bursts the bubble reputation accorded to M. Witte. The whole credit for the issue of the diplomatic victory belongs solely and exclusively to the czar. Indeed, M. Witte did his best to prevent it by repeatedly urging his sovereign to give way on the question of money, in which he was strongly supported by Count Lamsdorff. Far from being a victory for M. Witte, the peace of Portsmouth in reality marks the utter and unqualified failure of his views and predictions."

CHOICE OF DEATH LIVE WIRE ABOVE BOILING METAL BENEATH. Nels Anderson Chose to be Electrocutted Rather Than Fall Into the Vat of White Hot Metal and Was Instantly Killed. Chicago, Sept. 5.—Nels Anderson, a motor inspector for the Illinois Steel company, chose death by electrocution in preference to a more horrible fate in one of the company's metal pits at the South Chicago works. Anderson was doing repair work on the arm of a crane directly above one of the hot metal pits. A slight movement of the arm caused him to lose his balance. The only support within reach was an uninsulated live wire, which connected the crane with power. The doomed man gave one glance at the white-hot metal below and caught the wire on his hand, falling into it. He was almost instantly killed, and the body hung over the wire until the current could be shut off.

It is supposed, in Sofia that some big movement is on foot, and the Turkish authorities fear serious disturbances. The Bulgarian bands in Macedonia are extremely mobile.

IS 'SPIRITUAL' The Kiss a Minister Gave A Woman. SHE DIDN'T OBJECT CHARGE AGAINST REV. GEORGE HUMES. She Said Minister Osculated Three Times—Defendant Admitted He Kissed Her Once on Forehead. Greensburg, Pa., Sept. 5.—The story of a midnight walk taken by seventeen-year-old Daisy Porch and Rev. George Humes, the girl's pastor, down a blind lane at Keesburg, near Latrobe, on May 27th when, it is alleged, the clergyman kissed and embraced the girl, was told in court before Judge L. W. Doty and a jury. The jury, after deliberating an hour, acquitted the clergyman and divided the costs between him and his defender. The defendant, Rev. Mr. Humes, is married and is the father of two bright little girls, Elsie Porch, whose father is a wealthy farmer in her direct testimony, said the clergyman embraced her and kissed her three times against her objection. It developed during the trial that the Keesburg congregation as a consequence of the kissing affair, is disrupted and it was said that the purpose of the prosecution was to secure a conviction in order that Pastor Humes might be unfrocked and dismissed from the charge. Rev. Mr. Humes was sworn, and for two hours was subjected to cross-examination by Attorney Eicher. He denied that he had placed his arms about Daisy Porch, but admitted that he kissed her once on the forehead. He said: "She was willing to let me kiss her, for she leaned over so I could do so." He admitted that he had kissed other girls, whereupon Attorney Eicher stigmatised the defendant as "a kissing bug."

A NEW COURSE Has Been Provided at the Woodbine. Special to the Whig. Toronto, Sept. 5.—The Ontario Jockey Club, will have an entirely new race course for their autumn races, which commence September 10th. Immediately after the spring meeting was over operations commenced. Charles W. Hewitt, Jr., engineer, who reconstructed Saetooga five years ago, and who more recently built Belmont Park, of the Westchester Racing Association, of New York, has had charge of the reconstruction of Woodbine Park. To the end that greater accommodation be afforded the public a new back stretch has been built into Ashbridge Bay, which joins Lake Ontario at this point. At the eastern end of the new back stretch the race course has been extended in the direction of Lake Ontario some two hundred feet. The new course is one mile around and is flat, which has been well banked. It has a much bigger radius than the old one, the widening of the turns having been effected without materially shortening the stretch. The new track is about seventy-five feet wide in the stretches. The building of the course, in a southerly direction, has made possible a beautiful expanse of lawn room of some one hundred feet or more, which has been given sufficient slope so that a splendid view during the progress of the race can be obtained from any point of the course. Clouds Obscured Vision. Steamer With Party Has Arrived at Blanc Sablon. Ottawa, Sept. 5.—A private telegram from Blanc Sablon, sixty miles east of Chateau Bay, announces the arrival there of the steamer King Edward, with the Canadian observation party to Labrador on board, all well. As was feared from the results of the American expedition, the Canadian party was equally unsuccessful, no observations of the eclipse being possible, owing to the cloudy weather. Not a single photograph was secured.

French Government Feels for Fishing Boats. London, Sept. 5.—A Paris despatch says the minister of foreign affairs is engaged in negotiations with the British, American, German and Dutch governments with a view to diverting the still existing mail steamer routes across the banks of Newfoundland, owing to numerous accidents to fishing vessels through the presence of the great liners.

Population of Massachusetts. Boston, Sept. 5.—The population of Massachusetts is 2,998,855, according to a preliminary report made by the state bureau of statistics. This is an increase of 498,775 over 1905, when the last official census was taken. Boston's population is 593,588, an increase of 96,675 in the past ten years, or 19.55 per cent.

7,000 Houses Burned. Adrianople, Turkey, Sept. 5.—Nearly 7,000 houses, of which only fifteen were insured, have been completely destroyed by fire in this city. Many victims perished in the flames.

ENGULFED A SCORE FIVE SURVIVORS OF SEVONA REACH A HAVEN. Seven Left to Their Fate Barge Pretoria Goes Down With Five Aboard—Schooner and Crew Missing. Ashland, Wis., Sept. 5.—More than a score of lives were lost and property valued at half a million dollars destroyed in a furious storm that swept over Lake Superior from Friday night to Sunday night. Besides the wreck of the steel steamer Sevona, which broke in two on Sand Island Reef, seven of the crew, including the captain, losing their lives, the barge Pretoria, of Bay City, Mich., carrying a crew of ten men, sank, five sailors being drowned. The schooner Olive Jones, etc., with a crew of seven men, is also thought to be lost. The Olive Jeanette, it is believed, went to the bottom about ten miles from Portage Entry. This schooner was in tow of the steamer L. R. Doty when the latter vessel was lost with her entire crew on Lake Michigan a few years ago. The storm of the last three days at times reached the proportions of a hurricane, and the staunchest new steel vessels were forced to run for shelter.
