SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST. HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situated; or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situated, receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

HOMESTEAD DUTIES: A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this Act, resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with his father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by his residence upon the said land.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT: should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

Coal.—Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by an individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.

Quartz.—A free miner's certificate is granted upon payment in advance of \$7.50 per annum for an individual, and from \$50 to \$100 per annum for a company according to its capital.

A free miner, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,500x1,500 feet.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5.

At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 an acre.

The patent provides for the payment of a royalty of 24 per cent on the net value of the output after deducting \$10,000.

FLACER mining claims generally are 100 feet square; entry fee \$5, renewable yearly.

A free miner may obtain two leases to dredge for gold in any one year, at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior. The leases shall have a direct in operation within one season from the date of the lease for each five miles of water, \$10 per annum for each mile of river leased, royalty at the rate of 24 per cent collected on the output after deducting \$10,000.

THE NEW PROVINCES

START OFF UNDER GOOD AUSPICES.

More Land in Them Than in Older Provinces—Many Railway Lines in Operation—Fine Financial State.

The provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan began their existence on September 1st, under specially favorable circumstances. They are of large extent. ALBERTA is estimated to contain a land area of 260,633, and Saskatchewan of 243,192 square miles. Each extends from the United States boundary to the 60th parallel of north latitude. Each contains a greater extent of cultivatable land than any of the older provinces. Between them they offer to the farmer the greatest unoccupied territory in North America. What Minnesota was in the early '60's, they are at the beginning of the twentieth century. As fertile as Manitoba they are four times the size of what is probably to-day the most famous wheat-growing province in the world. They have within their boundaries land adapted for all classes of agricultural industry. Grain grows from the Manitoba boundary to the foothills of the Rockies. There is a splendid ranching district. Alberta wool growers are already large producers of a staple which meets an unending demand. Coal mining is a developed industry. Other minerals exist, and exploration work may bring to light still other sources of natural wealth. The pioneering work has been done. It is a tried and proved land that people are invited to occupy and are occupying at a rate hardly hoped for even up to ten years ago. Communication is easy. Saskatchewan is reached by six railway lines from Manitoba and one from the United States. Some of these will in a short time be extended to the borders of Alberta, which is already served by three of the Canadian Pacific lines, and one to the United States border. Others are projected and in course of construction. The conditions in the Grand Trunk Pacific. The conditions in the two provinces offer to the homesteader the maximum opportunity for success with the minimum of inconvenience.

The provinces start financially also on a good basis. Two lots in each township are set apart as school lands and will in time when sold form an endowment for education that, if wisely administered, will provide means for a system of common schools equal to anything in North America. The allowance as subsidy, etc., is liberal. The estimated population of each province is 250,000. In neither case, however, is this figure likely to be reached for some time. Each province will at the beginning receive from the dominion treasury the following sums annually:

For support of government... \$50,000
 Subsidy... \$600,000
 Allowance in lieu of lands... \$75,000
 Debt allowance... \$45,375
 Allowance for public buildings... \$5,000

Total... \$1,124,125

This is a population considered, at the most generous. It is not too much, however, considering the large territory that has to be looked after, and in which there is as yet but little municipal organization. With the taxes which can be imposed without creating undue burdens on commerce or commercial facilities, these sums, the total of which will increase as the provinces grow in population, should enable the new administrations to do their duty efficiently and well, and aiding in the development of the territory they will act for they will help in the advancement of Canada as a whole.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The eruption of Stromboli continues to cause anxiety.

The North Atlantic steamship agreement is broken.

Ten people were killed and fifty wounded in riots at Libau.

The United States cable service to Japan by the Formosa route is resumed.

Pay checks of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad were forged and put in circulation.

An increasing business in the iron and steel industries is reported in Great Britain.

Martin Kelly, aged sixty-five, died in the Toronto patrol wagon on the way to the police station.

Four women stowaways who attempted to enter the United States at Ogdenburg, were discovered.

Cholera is reported to have appeared in Tarnoff, Galicia, Austria and three deaths occurred in one day.

William Jones, Fore and Jeppette car inspector, was killed at St. Thomas by falling of a yard engine.

The Buffalo regiment were given a warm welcome on Saturday and at the church parade in Toronto.

Hon. Mr. Matheson is going to England in connection with the financing of the Temiskaming railway.

Helena Hobert, a young girl twenty-one years of age, was found drowned in the canal at St. John's, Que.

The Russian health department has renewed its assurance that there are no cases of cholera in the empire.

One woman was killed and twenty people were injured, five fatally, by the explosion of a bomb at Barcelona.

John Burns, M.P., the English labor leader, has arrived at Montreal. He will study labor conditions in Canada.

The Duke of Orleans' Greenland expedition has discovered an unknown land, which was named Terre de France.

Two Russian domestics were nearly asphyxiated by illuminating gas at the Hayley hotel, Queen street west, Toronto.

Wing Lee, a Toronto Chinaman, crossed over into Lewiston and was seized by the United States customs officials.

The French government has sent an ultimatum to Morocco, demanding indemnity for the imprisonment of a French subject.

W. B. Wood, ex-M.P.P., registrar of deeds for Brant county, has resigned, claiming he can make twice as much money in business.

Mary Miller, an English domestic, committed suicide in the Assiniboine river at Winnipeg, being desperate from the pain of neuritis.

St. Gilbert Parker, the distinguished Canadian writer, and John Burns, M.P., are to be entertained this month by the Canadian Club at Ottawa.

Dr. Daniel Clark has retired, and Dr. F. S. Snider, Waterford, has been appointed to succeed him as superintendent of Toronto insane asylum.

The Montreal police found an unknown man lying on the city wharves with a fractured skull and at the point of death. Foul play is suspected.

Lieut.-Governor Bulyea has called upon A. C. Rutherford, president of the Great Trunk Railway Association, for the first government of the province of Alberta.

Three new Russian battleships in course of construction at St. Petersburg, cannot be completed now, because their engines are found to be too big for their hulls.

The Church Army are applying to British government for £20,000 to send 2,000 unemployed to Canada next February. The people are to refund the money by interest work and wages.

The United States board of immigration has ordered all passengers for the United States from Germany to be at the port of embarkation six days prior to sailing.

The second cruiser squadron has left Quebec for the lower provinces and will be at Halifax, N.S., on the 18th September. On October 2nd the squadron leaves for New York.

Hon. R. W. Scott, Canadian secretary of state, has sent congratulations to Baron Komura on behalf of the Canadian government, and also renewed the invitation to visit Canada.

A wireless telegraph station is to be established on Partridge Island, at the mouth of the harbor at St. John, N.B. The station is being erected under direction of the Canadian government.

The Porte has replied to the note of the six embassies declining to accept the scheme proposed by them for the financial control of Macedonia. The powers will insist on the acceptance of the scheme.

There is an unconfirmed report that the Saskatchewan Valley & Manitoba Land company have sold all their western land holdings, about two million acres, to Col. A. Davidson, representing a St. Paul syndicate.

The British Turbine Victoria, on her way from Montreal for Liverpool, ran aground at Cap Charles, thirty miles this side of Quebec. There was a heavy fog at the time, thickened by dense smoke from forest fires.

Steps have been taken for the Spanish naturalization of Prince Ferdinand of Bavaria, who will receive appropriate Spanish rank, on his marriage with the Infanta Maria Theresa youngest sister of King Alfonso.

The police authorities have forbidden the transportation of Russian emigrants through Hamburg, on account of the appearance of cholera. The Hamburg-American Steamship company will refuse to accept tickets to Russian emigrants.

The officers, employees and lawyers of the large Chicago industries, who were indicted by the last federal grand jury on charges of conspiracy in violation of the federal anti-trust and interstate commerce laws, will appear before the United States district court on Tuesday.

The report of the British board of agriculture to the colonial office against the emigration of the emigrants on Canadian cattle says the existing law does not cast any discredit on Canadian cattle, for it holds good not only in the case of the United States and other foreign countries, but in every British colony, including Australia and New Zealand, whence live cattle have in the past been imported. It is merely a sanitary law of universal application.
