

BURNS AND BAKER

THE ENGLISH MEMBERS IN THE CITY.

John Burns, a Leader in Labor Circles—He Has a Few Things to Say to An Interviewer—Visiting the West.

John Burns, M.P., the famous labor representative in the English House of Commons arrived in Canada by the Bavarian on Saturday night. After a short stay in Montreal he continued on west, arriving in Kingston by the steamer Toronto yesterday afternoon.

He is accompanied by J. Allen Baker, M.P., for one of the districts of London, and at whose instigation the present trip to the colony is being made. Indeed it was only on that gentleman's expressed wish to visit the old Limestone city and the scenes of his childhood that the well-known leaders are in the city. The Hon. G. P. Graham, Brockville, and James Cummings, of Lyn, are also members of the party, who stayed here over night, the guests of John F. Baker, Alvington avenue.

"That while in Montreal I viewed the labor day parade. Walking the entire length thereof I came to my own trade. There I joined in, riding with the president and secretary of the craft. Afterwards I shook hands with every one of my fellow-traders and discussed labor matters with them. The information since acquired has not been such as in any way to alter the opinions then moulded."

Speaking of his trip through the Thousand Islands Mr. Burns could not be too expressive. "They are fully up to the sample," he mused; "they are indeed beautiful, grand."

As for Kingston itself it reminded the Englishman of many of the cities of the old country. Listen to this opinion from a man like the famous M.P.: "Indeed your city is in many ways superior to the larger centres at home and abroad. It is beautiful indeed! And the streets are so well looked after. In the way of cleanliness it could give many lessons to the larger metropolises."

Let Kingston take that to heart and ponder over it.

Either before he goes west, to-day, or on his return, Mr. Burns will visit the hamlet on the shores of Loughboro Lake, Battersca. "I wish to see," were his words, "whether the little Canadian Battersca is following in the footsteps of the English Battersca or whether the city which I have the honor to represent has fallen from grace and erred from the straight and narrow path."

Finally speaking of the inhabitants of the city, the visitor was more than pleased with them and the treatment received at their hands. They have done everything possible to make the visit as enjoyable as possible.

While in the city Prof. Shortt, of Queen's, who is recognizing over America as an authority on problems socialistic, had a chat with Mr. Burns last evening, and again this morning. The distinguished guests visited Queen's University this morning, and will probably leave for the west by the steamer Kingston this evening.

J. Allen Baker, who accompanies Mr. Burns, on his present tour is no stranger to Canadians and will no doubt be warmly received by many Kingstonians, as he formerly resided in the city. Before returning to the land of his adoption, Mr. Baker will probably visit the place of his birth, Trenton.

J. Allen Baker is the Canadian who a few months ago inflicted a decisive defeat on a Chamberlainite candidate in East Finbury, after one of the hardest parliamentary campaigns that have taken place in London for many years. His particular platform is municipal ownership and for years he waged a successful war on its behalf in the London county council of which he was a member. His particular objective point was the tramway system which riddled the people right and left.

According to late advice the fight has concluded in the upholding of the people's rights and to-day the municipality is in possession of franchises giving it the control of the tramways. The steamer Kingston left on August 29, in company with George Hawes, a noted author on social problems, and an assistant editor of the London Daily News, the official organ of the liberal party.

Both Mr. Burns and Mr. Baker are pronounced free traders and Mr. Baker made no prophecy as to when the general election in the United Kingdom will take place they predict the utter defeat of the conservative party and the complete repudiation of Mr. Chamberlain's policy when the appeal is made to the people.

Mr. Baker observed that the only infirmity to be drawn from the bye-elections that had taken place during the last two years and for which the constituencies that had been conservative for the last twenty years had unmistakably proclaimed their adherence to free trade, was that the country would tolerate no departure from the policy under which it had prospered so long and under which it was still prospering. "My own constituency of East Finbury," said Mr. Baker, "is a typical illustration. For two parliamentary terms it has been represented by unionist members and at the last election we succeeded in turning an adverse vote of 317 into a majority of 708 in our favor."

It is the intention of the Parliamentarians to spend some time in Toronto, where Mr. Burns will call on the offices of different labor organizations. President W. K. McNaught telegraphed Mr. Burns, inviting him to the exhibition. It is probable that he will also be entertained by the city council if he goes to Toronto. Mayor Croushore informed one of the labor men that the council would be pleased to do anything to make Mr. Burns' visit to the city a pleasant one.

WHAT A PETERBORO PAPER HAS TO SAY.

The latter have ignored a largely-signed petition of Queen's graduates to appoint a Canadian as assistant professor of modern languages, and have instead appointed at Cambridge, Eng., man. One would think that the trustees of Queen's would, even if they lacked patriotism, have availed themselves of the advertisement which would have been represented by appointing one of the graduates of a university that has been turning out graduates—and good ones, too—for many years. A Queen's graduate with European recommendations, was an unsuccessful candidate for the position in his alma mater, captured by the Cambridge man, and no doubt he was well fitted for it, for he had no doubt specially qualified himself by study abroad for just such a position. Such a rebuff received at the hands of his university is rather a wet blanket upon the enthusiasm of Canadians to excel. Why, can't, or won't, a prophet's own country honor him? A graduate of those universities developed by old country universities is of a high character, but Canadian universities make good scholars, too. A graduate of a Canadian university is not long ago made a professor in one of those "twins of learning—Oxford." How would the trustees of Queen's regard the situation if the friends of that university should invite them to go to the old country for their students? But there's no danger of that, the friends of Queen's are too loyal to it to take that course. They will suffer in silence as they have done on former occasions, and be ready with their purses in the interest of endowment funds to pay "foreign" professors, and Queen's graduates may content themselves with a lucrative situation in some rural high school.
