RESIDENCE BURNED.—Demonstration Made Against Kurokura's and Katsura's.

Tokio, Sept. 5. (Delayed in transmission).—Serious rioting followed an attack on the office of the Kokumin Shimbu, the government official mob attacked and burned the residence of the minister of home affairs, which stood between the Nohjima club and the Imperial hotel and faced Hibiya Park, which was the storm centre throughout the day.

Threatening demonstrations occurred in the neighborhood of the official homes of Premier Katsura and Baron Komura, the foreign minister, now in the United States, but the police succeeded in preventing injury to the occupants or damage to the houses.

SUDDENLY RETURNS

MAN MOURNED AS HANGED FOR EIGHTEEN YEARS.

Singular Coincidence in Names Leads Woman to Believe Husband Was Convicted of Murder.

London, Sept. 7.—Thomas Daley has just returned to Watton, Norfolk, after an absence of eighteen years, to find that his wife and old associates believed he had been hanged for murder in 1898.

The mistake arose from a singular coincidence. Ten years after he had left Watton a man of the same name who was also a bricklayer, murdered a woman named Penfold, at Maidstone, and suffered the extreme penalty of the law. The local papers reported the murder as having been committed by a local man, and Mrs. Daley regarded herself as the widow of a murderer.

When Daley heard of the crime he was working near London, and laughingly remarked to a fellow workman that his brother was being hanged. He first heard of his association with the murder two years ago, but took no steps to clear up the mistake. His return to Watton after an absence of eighteen years, and doings of his old friends have called to identify him and talk with him.

COMMERCE IN CHINA. United States Has Laid Proposals Before Britain.

Birmingham, Sept. 8.—The London correspondent of the Post states that, as a direct result of the treaty of peace between Russia and Japan, the United States has laid certain proposals before Great Britain for the regulation of European and American commerce in China, especially in Manchuria, and Korea. If these should be accepted, the American minister to British minister, Sir Edward Satow, the British minister to China, and Mr. Roosevelt, the American minister to China, without waiting for the action of the other powers, will lay certain most important proposals before China and Japan.

Her travelling suit was brown pearl chamois with blue duchess silk blouse and hat to match. Mr. Hoffman and bride left on the noon train for Toronto and other points west. The presents were beautiful and costly, showing the high esteem in which the bride is held by her many friends.
