



LONDON GOES SWIMMING.

Although Great City Advances Is Not Up to Roman Standard Yet.

becoming quite common. We have not yet quite attained to the standard of the ancient Romans, who provided in every town of their empire splendid baths, which anyone might use for nothing or a farthing at most. But we are undoubtedly improving, says The London Daily Telegraph. Twenty-five London boroughs out of 28 have erected swimming baths. From Dan even unto Beersheba, from the East India Docks to Wandsworth these temples of health are scattered. Nearly every-body in London, in spite of the three backward boroughs, is within easy distance of a good swimming bath. When it is remembered that fifteen years ago baths were few and far between, it must be acknowledged that

Fifteen years ago it was hardly considered possible that London women should want to swim. Probably swimming was pronounced "not quite nice," and there, of course, was an end of ing a curious noise like the bark of a swimming baths are reserved for women at least one or two days in week, or in some cases one of the ponds is reserved for women entirely. The charge is inconsiderable. Sixpence will admit to the first-class baths and provide costume and towels as well, while 2d suffices for the cheaper var-

Few people, however, would swim in a bath if they could swim in the open cilities for open-air bathing in a great restricted, but the London County Council has contrived to provide bathing places in a number of open spaces. Bathing is permitted in the lakes at Brockwell Park, Victoria Park, Hampstead Heath, Parliament Hill, Clapham Common and Plumstead Common; and at Willesden the local authorities have provided an excellent lake in Gladstone Park, where once a week ladies may keep up their swimming. Thus, it will be observed, a ring of baths has been placed round the suburbs, and it is difficult to see how, failing the Thames itself, more are to be provided in the heart of London. Some of these lakes have been prepared at considerable expense, floored and walled with concrete, and provide bathing places as good as the heart of man need desire. Unforthe threshold of his career-these are tunately, the hours of bathing are severely limited. In most of the lakes you may swim only at early morn and dewy eve. There are, however, exceptions. Except on Sundays, you may bathe in the ponds on Hampstead Heath and Parliament Hill at any hour, and it would seem that this regulation might with advantage be extended. At


