BRITT-NELSON FIGHT.

It Promises to Be a Memorable Event. Special to the Whig. Coahuila, Cal., Sept. 9.—Not since Jimmy Corbett and Bob Fitzsimmons boxed in Carson City, has any prize fight attracted as much attention as the battle which Jimmy Britt and Rattling Nelson will fight this afternoon in the new pavilion erected within the Union Cursing Park enclosure.

At first the proposition was to make the fight one of fifty rounds, but that was afterwards changed to forty-five rounds. Even as it is, there is scarcely any doubt that it will be a finish fight, as both men are too active fighters to make it possible that the battle will go on for so many rounds without one or the other being knocked out.

Both men are in the pink of condition and a highly interesting and spirited battle is expected. With a few exceptions the betting on the fight is practically even. Britt has expressed himself confident of being able to knock out Nelson, but experts are inclined to believe that the fact that the fight is for forty-five rounds, gives some advantage to Nelson, who is over so far as to sell tickets of admission to his training camp.
