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## A FASHION LETTER NOTHING DEFINITE DECREED FOR COMING SEASON.

Skirts Still Wide at Bottom, Close-Fitting on Hips—Deep Reds Favorites—Black Tailor-Made Frock Still Rules the Day.

Special to the Whig. New York, Sept. 9.—Already autumn checked or plaid materials are in the shops, but nothing definite has been decreed as the thing for the coming season. Still some things can be reckoned on as almost certain. All authorities are agreed that skirts are to continue wide at the bottom and fitted with clinging closeness around the hips. The new models show innumerable ways of obtaining these results and the fate of the skirt is still undecided. They are either as new nor as fast as the gored and circular skirts fitting smoothly over the hips and having a wide rippling fullness at the bottom. The circular skirt is better suited to long skirt length than to the short and the majority of the best makers reserve it for the full length models using the gored patterns for short skirt. The circular skirt does not keep its shape so well in the short length. A fall street frock shown is of English suiting checked in two tones of gray. The skirt is circular of the type most favored for walking costumes. It is a rippling model with wide front seam and flat trimming of narrow bias bands. These simple horizontal bands stitched flatly or flat tucks are the forms of trimming most often seen on the new tailoring models. Two tones checked in white or colors will not be in style this fall because of their over-popularity this summer but broken checks and plaids in shadings of one color or all in one—some with the checked or plaid effect produced by variations in the weaving—and the thread finish are to be seen in large numbers and some of the best street frocks shown so far are made of these fabrics. A greenish blue, one seen in beautiful and serviceable soft woolsens small, indefinite checks and plaids in green and blue, blue and black, brown and black, green and black, and the wine red and black.

One New York house is showing some expensive novelties in certain shaded plaid cloths which are marvels of skill in weaving and coloring. Herringbone chevrons and serge are much used for tailor-made costumes, but broadcloth and satin cloth will, as usual, be the material par excellence for the dressy tailor made. All of last season's colors are to be seen, but there are new shadings different from those to which we are accustomed. This is especially true of the reds and blues. The deeper reds seem to be especially emphasized at present, but it is too early to predict finally what the fashionable color of the season will be. Among other colors seen in these fabrics are the Parma violet shades, beetroot reds, pruned mulberry, olive greens from dark to light, and in spite of contradictory rumors as to its status for the fall and winter season, there are certain copper and bronze browns and some shades of chestnut brown represented in the best materials.

The light bright shades of blue will probably be little worn this fall but there is talk of reviving navy blues for street wear. A greenish blue, on the style of the old-time peacock blue, has gradually come into fashion in military, and is seen on some of the smartest advance tail models. The black tailoring costume is likely to be as fashionable as ever this year and the woman who must consider the cost will find the black strictly tailored frock the most economical investment. The coat and skirt costume will be popular as ever and much latitude is allowed in the matter of color lengths. It may be any length from the bolero to the redingote. In fact it is rumored that the latter is to be even more worn than it was in the past season. The coat may be semi or close fitted although the tendency is toward the close fitting. There are rumors of overskirts, but the mode of wearing this style of tunic overskirt or more frequently simulated tunic effects made by rucking the skirt on the line that a tunic overskirt would tack and setting a tunic over the skirt.

For dressy afternoon wear, the bodice have the popular elbow sleeve and it goes without saying that evening gowns must have short sleeves if any at all. Even the rain coats have the sleeves reaching only to the elbow and the lower arm will have to be protected by long gloves in many cases. Velvet will be worn as much as ever and the general impression is that the material are of a soft chiffon character and are to be had in any number of beautiful colors. The princess model will be seen in evening gowns, street gowns and visiting gowns, but they should only be worn by those who have an impeccable figure as on

such alone will they have that smart and chic effect on which they depend for their becomingness. The in-between season is the most difficult one for the average woman to bridge over and still look presentable, for all such, the wisest plan would be to purchase a bodice and skirt made of material durable enough for hard wear and made on very simple lines so that it can be worn mornings in the house and be a good street frock with a separate coat. This dress can be worn until November for a street costume and will do for the mornings in the house during the winter. Cashmere, hennetta cloth and draps d'ete are all popular and excellent materials for such a suit. Some medium dark color such as blue or better still, green, brown or a dark blue red; all practical colors yet not too somber.—ESTELLE CLARWENT.

**TEMPERANCE IN ENGLAND.**  
A Decrease in Wine and Spirit Drinking.  
The remarkable wave of temperance which is at present spreading all over England is said "to be due, in the first place, to economical conditions, and, secondly, to the great change in public taste."

"One of the chief reasons of the decrease in the national drink bill," said J. John Ross, secretary of the National Temperance League, "is the striking condemnation of the use of alcohol by some of the most influential medical authorities. Another important factor in the decrease of consumption of wine and spirits is the fashion set by the large number of American visitors, who show a remarkable preference for hard temperance drinks. The total abstinance of the majority of the labor leaders is also beginning to tell on the laboring classes and members of trade unions, many of whom are now beginning to realize that teetotalism is an important stepping stone to future progress."

"There is no doubt," said the manager of one of the largest firms of wine merchants, "that the decrease in wine and spirit drinking is due to the present tightness of money and the high rate of income tax. In consequence of this the public is only spending about half as much on wines as it was formerly in the habit of doing."

During the recent heat wave the change in the national habit of drinking has been especially noticeable. Comparatively little business has been done by the public bars, while the sellers of iced drinks, soda, etc., have been kept at full pressure.
