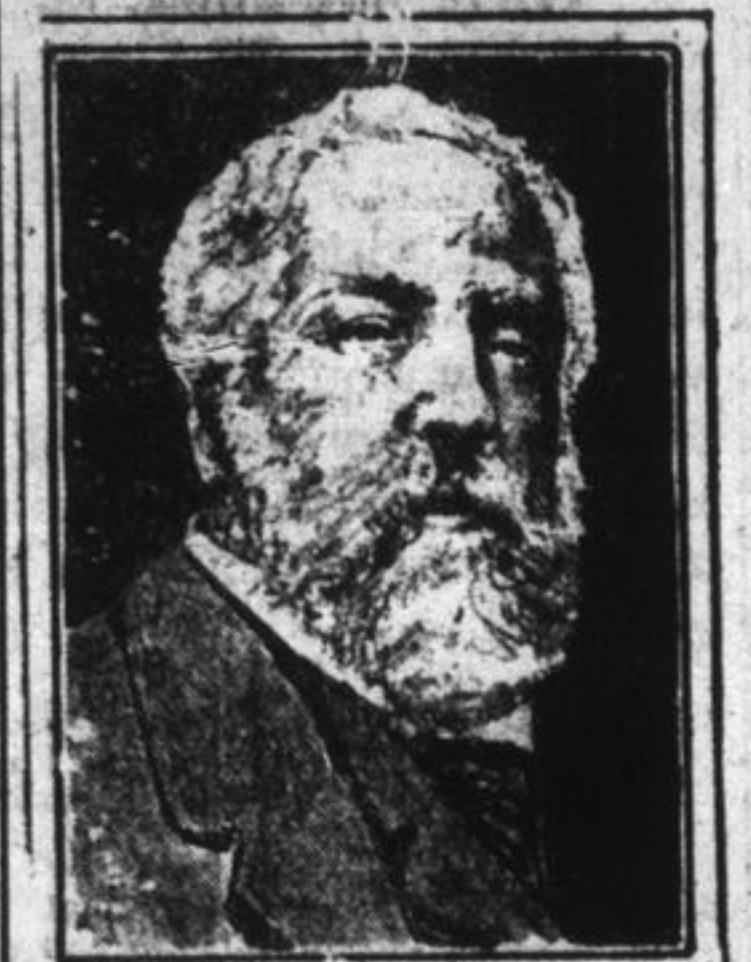

DANCING AND DEVOTION

One Calls the Art "Praying With the Feet."
New York, Sept. 14.—Fifty professors of dancing, representatives from all over the United States, of the American Society of Professors of Dancing, are busy in the Hotel Majestic, concocting terpsichorean novelties for the coming season. According to one of the professors who quotes Schiller, dancing is a "praying with the feet," and it is the purpose of this society to make foot-prayer orthodox. One of the greatest problems of this season is the naming of the new dances, whether, for instance, the new gavotte shall be called the Roosevelt. Would it not be better, in view of the president's recent activities in the peace negotiations, to call it "Diplomacy"? This question has not yet been decided.

Oskar Duenweg, of Terre Haute, has introduced what he calls the Credo waltz. Some one criticized this name, and wondered if it would not be objected to.

"Oh, no," he said, "I think the name is a very good one. It means, 'I believe,' and I believe in this waltz, the queen of the dance, as the very best. This waltz combines all the known waltz movements—backward, forward and sideways in a round dance. It is not meant for beginners. It is a composition which stands to the ordinary waltz as a chopstick of Liszt to a five-finger exercise on the piano."

Mr. Duenweg has great ideas for the future of dancing. It is never intended, he said, to be socially a time-killer, but its study should be the means for aesthetic development of the body. The sessions of the society yesterday and to-day were occupied in rehearsing new figures for the coming season. At the end of the session the judges will determine which figures will be sprung on the public. Pictou, Sept. 13.—A young lad, aged thirteen, named Fredericks, severely cut his arm between the wrist and elbow, on Sunday. The boy was whitening, drawing the blade towards him, when the knife slipped, inflicting a big gash in the flesh. Potatoes are no crop in the country. RELICS OF THE PLAGUE.
Many Skeletons Found Near the Glasgow Hospital.

London, Sept. 14.—Ghastly discoveries have been made at the cutting of the foundations in connection with the Glasgow Royal Infirmary reconstruction scheme. Hundreds of dead bodies have been found in the ground adjacent to the present institution. It appears that during the cholera epidemic in Glasgow about sixty years ago pits were dug at this place and carcasses of bodies were thrown in daily. The pits were eventually covered up, and practically forgotten. Although a famous surgeon of the Royal Infirmary once sought to point out that the presence of the bodies, many of which still lie beneath the buildings of the old infirmary itself, was a menace to the health of the patients.

The bodies have been found in great heaps. It is said that in one heap alone there were the remains of sixty persons. The horror of the sights have worked upon the nerves of the labourers employed. Several have refused to work, and special men have had to be brought into service. The work of excavation is being done mostly at night, and in the early morning carts are engaged taking the bones and coffins to a plot of ground at Biddie, outside the city, where they are reburied.
