# R. WALDRON.

### VERY CURIOUS CASE CHARGED WITH WEARING OTHER MAN'S CLOTHES.

Steam Engineers Will Meet, Next Year, in Milwaukee—Stringent Regulations Against Pauper Labor Demanded.

Special to the Whig. Toronto, Sept. 15.—There was a curious case before Magistrate Benison, this morning. William Jetty was found by a policeman wearing clothes belonging to a fellow boarder, who had complained of being robbed. Two of the boarders identified Jetty as the man who had lived with them. Jetty, in his own defence, protested that he had never seen any of the witnesses before, and that he had not stolen the wearing apparel. His brother John, who lives at the home of Madame Lovell, at 211 Craig street and who is employed as a C. P. R. brakeman, gave him the things, he said. Jetty was remanded, pending information from Montreal concerning the twin brothers.

After three ballots, the International Steam Engineers decided, today, that next year's convention should meet in Milwaukee, Wis. A resolution demanding more stringent regulations against the admission of pauper labor from Europe was unanimously carried. In the discussion on the subject it was asserted that every effort was being made to unload on the United States and Canada the paupers of Europe.

The city of Hamilton has been granted the privilege of appealing directly to the court of appeal, in the action brought against the corporation by the Hamilton Distillery company and the Hamilton Brewery association, for having charged seven and one-half cents per thousand gallons for water to ordinary manufacturers and brewers twelve cents per thousand. The latter objected to the discrimination, and the court held that this was illegal. An appeal was entered, and Chief Justice Ross has now granted the privilege of carrying the question direct to the higher tribunal.

The deep waterways commission met here, this morning, in the city hall. Chairman Mayes called Acting Mayor Spencer to give information regarding Toronto harbor. Ald. Spencer, in the course of his speech said that if any scheme adopted by the commission resulted in reducing the level of the water in the harbor it would be an inevitable disaster to the city.

Harbormaster Postlethwaite concurred. The construction of anything in the shape of a dam at the Niagara river would affect the levels of Lake Ontario, he said. If the Lake Erie level was raised two feet, it could not be hoped to raise the level of Lake Ontario would suffer, said Mr. Postlethwaite, to whatever proportion of water was required to fill up Lake Erie. A breakwater, at Kingston, would prevent danger to Lake Ontario but the navigation interests in St. Lawrence could not be expected to permit of that for a moment. Speaking of the difference of lake levels, Mr. Postlethwaite said it was due not only to rain and snow, but also to particularly evaporation. Last spring when there was much dull weather, there was little evaporation, and consequently, the water was higher than it had been for thirteen years.

Chairman Mayes said desired work at the foot of Lake Erie, to which reference had been made, was intended not to raise, but only maintain the levels in the lake. He promised that the lake ports, on both sides, should receive the most considerate treatment in anything that the commission would recommend. A number of representative business men addressed the commission, and asserted that any proposal which would tend to lower the water level in Toronto harbor, would be opposed strenuously. William Drew, employed by J. Larty, druggist, dropped dead on Spadina avenue, this morning.

### ARMISTICE SIGNED

After a Conference Lasting Nine Hours.

Special to the Whig. Headquarters, Russian Army, Manchuria, Sept. 15.—The armistice was signed yesterday after a conference lasting nine hours. Naval envoys will meet near Vladivostok, to determine what shall constitute the neutral sea zone.

### ROJSTVENSKY RECOVERED.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 15.—A letter from Japan says Vice-Admiral Rojstvensky has completely recovered from the wounds which he sustained at the battle of the Sea of Japan, but that he will not come home until the peace treaty is ratified.

### JEWS ARE ARMING.

And Summoning People to Revolt in Russia.

London, Sept. 15.—The correspondent of the Exchange telegraphs from St. Petersburg, that alarming reports have been received from the various districts, to the effect that Jews throughout the empire are arming themselves. The Jews are also said to be summoning people to a revolution.

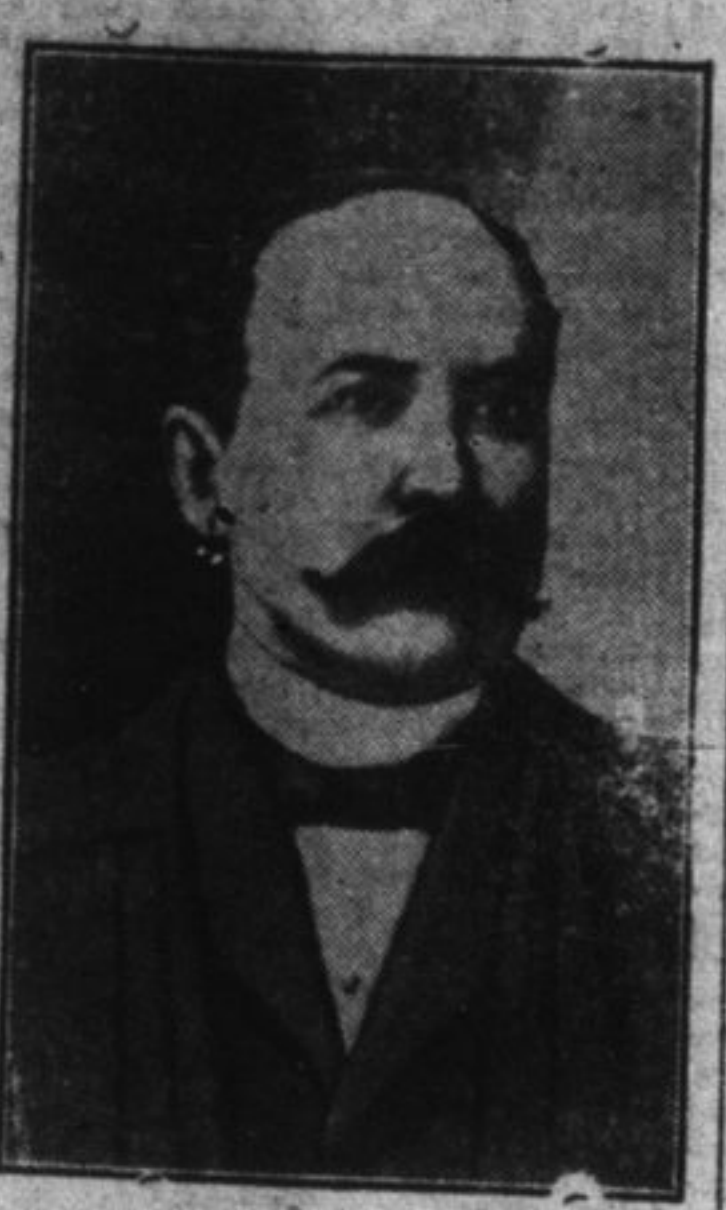

### IN PORT TO-DAY.

The steamer Hamilton arrived at Swift's wharf about 1.30 o'clock this afternoon. She was very late as her schedule time for reaching Kingston was Tuesday last. The cause of the delay was the accident to the Canada Atlantic bridge at Cornwall. A large freighter collided with the abutments tumbling the bridge into a total wreck. The railway company held the propeller for a \$10,000 seizure. The steamer Hamilton was about three lengths behind the freighter at the time, but had slowed down at the approach to the bridge, and thus escaped injury.

### Bending The Garment.

A unique custom among the orthodox Jews is responsible for a singular slit in the lapel of the modern coat. The Jew, when death visits his household, takes a knife and, cutting the slit, murmurs in Yiddish, "O God, I accept thy judgment." This custom, came down from antiquity and known as "kree" (rending the garment), is associated with such solemn and religious obligations that a stern Hebrew father, as a punishment for a son or daughter who marries out of the faith, will rend his garment in token of the death of such a child. The act is emblematic of the profoundest grief.

### A Popular Appointment.

The appointment of W. R. Motherwell as minister of agriculture and provincial secretary in the first Saskatchewan cabinet is hailed with delight in Perth and railway. Hon. Mr. Motherwell is a Bathurst boy; a brother of Messrs. R. and J. D. of Bathurst. He has been living in Abernethy, N.W.T., for a number of years, where he owns and operates a large farm, and has always taken a prominent part in the farmers' interests of the North-West.

### SIR GILBERT PARKER

#### THE GUEST OF SIR WILFRID IN OTTAWA.

Predicts Downfall of Balfour Government—Neptune's Delay Providential Thing—Might Have Been Suffering Otherwise.

Special to the Whig. Ottawa, Sept. 15.—Sir Gilbert Parker arrived in the city, to-day, and is a guest of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Interviewed, he expressed views similar to those given elsewhere, predicting the downfall of the Balfour government and the eventual triumph of the Chamberlain policy.

The Transcontinental railway commission, to-day, considered the situation at Winnipeg, arising from the difficulties in connection with securing land by Mackenzie & Mann for terminal facilities. A meeting will be held, at Quebec, at a later date, when an amicable settlement is expected.

The delay of the steamer Neptune, at St. John's, N.B., was a providential thing, according to the views held by officials here. If there had been no delay there might have been suffering among the Hudson's Bay people. The mounted police party are provisioned for three years. The Neptune's cargo was chiefly coal, and by the delay it was able to take in supplies to the Hudson's Bay people, delayed, owing to her steamer, the Police, coming to grief. The Neptune is expected to meet the Arctic, off Chateau Bay, to-morrow.
