Evangelists to Visit Canadian Cities—The Showing of the Y. M. C. A.—To Take Up Work at Brighton.

Rev. F. J. Sherman, formerly of London, Ont., has been made rector of St. John's church, Buffalo, N.Y.

Rev. Mr. Turnbull, St. George's church, Galesburg, was offered the office of rural dean of the county of Huron, but declined.

Rev. Herbert A. Vuata, Ph.D., of Chicago, has accepted a call to the professorship of systematic theology at the Congregational College.

THE HUMID SUMMER Has Been Good For New York's Mosquitoes.

Special to the Whig, Sept. 16.—The excessive humidity of this summer has been highly favorable to the increase in the number of mosquitoes and other verminous insects, and has become an unbearable pest in Greater New York and its suburbs. The other night a policeman passing the Congregational church in Mount Vernon, noticed a dim light in the building.

He is undergoing a remarkable conversion. P. A. DeLava, a talented young Singaporean, an abstainer, and at once formed a total abstinence society. As a result of his agitation fifteen thousand people, pledged. The movement is being the hearty support of the governor, Sir Henry Blake.

The diocese of Boston stands first among Roman Catholic divisions of the country in the extent of its offerings for missions, supporting 17,000, France, after a proud leadership, eighty-two years. The Boston church has a mission organizer, who has formed a circle of ten each, with a leader, for aid and prayer for the loving service.

The organization of Christian commercial travellers, known as "The Gideon Society," is having a very healthy and prosperous growth. It is just five years ago since it was inaugurated by three men; to-day its membership numbers over six thousand, with camps in practically all the leading cities. A Gideon evangelistic campaign was recently held in Boston.

The Zionist movement among the Jews is steadily gaining ground. Under the leadership of the late Dr. Herzl it won the confidence of the Jewish people. At first through its leading ideal, that of making a Palestine once more the home of the race, was in harmony with Jewish aspiration, it encountered strong opposition, which is now rapidly lessening.

Deaconess Johnston, writing from Moose Fort, speaks of the Indians being more spoiled there than at Albany, because brought more into contact with civilization. A sadening and humiliating confession! At foreign stations it is not uncommon to have natives point to officers and soldiers and ask: Do you seek to make us Christians like these? Lord, save us from our friends!

At a year ago, Rev. John W. Chapman, Anvik, Alaska, asked for donations of spectacles or eyeglasses to improve and prolong the eyesight of his Indian parishioners. In a peculiar way he declared he could use about a peck of them. Well the appeal was heard and he received 153 donations aggregating three and a half bushels. The spectacle shows can now cease with perfect content.

The Year Book, just issued, shows that the Young Men's Christian Association in North America have increased to 1,826, with a membership of 351,982, of whom more than three-fifths are not connected with churches.

They own 517 buildings and other property worth \$2,000,000, an increase of \$2,400,000 in the year, besides \$2,738,000 pledged for 143 new buildings. The associations paid for current expenses last year and for surplus \$4,500,000.

At Split Lake 120 Indians presented the Bishop of Keewatin with a dress in Cree on white deer skin, embroidered with silk, and at their own initiative gave furs worth \$100, to be used for the fund for a church building, for which they will give labor, logs and lumber.

At service, hearty and orderly, forty-three were confirmed, all able to repeat the creed and catechism, and read the Cree Bible by meditation and recitation, and eighty. At Chippewa Deacon Service was ordained and inducted to the mission; twelve baptized, six confirmed.

It has been well said that "sympathy and love mingling with men are a closer copying of Jesus at Bethany and Cana, of the active apostles, Peter, the husband, and Paul, the well-known guest of Christian households and the founder of churches, than the need of service of God, and the broadest knowledge of life, its needs and its resources, its perils and foes, and that takes its stand in the thick of the fray, by example as well as by meditation and prayer, to lighten the world with the gospel, intensely in the world, but not of it."

NO EASE FOR THEM

RICH YOUNG MEN WHO PREFER STRENUOUS LIFE.

Ford Brooke Out with Book on the Russo-Japanese War—Will Wear Coronet as Sixth Earl of Warwick.

Lord Brooke, who has just published a clever and fascinating book on the Russo-Japanese war, an eye-witness in Manchuria is one of several gilded youths who, to their credit, prefer strenuous life to the idleness and pleasure-seeking which all the days of so many youthful aristocrats.

Lord Brooke, who will some day wear a coronet as sixth Earl of Warwick, is still on the sunny side of twenty-three, but, although, as years count, he is little more than a boy, he has crowded into his few years more work and experience of life than many a peer (and commoner, too) carries to his grave.

At eighteen he was doing excellent service in South Africa; he has been aide-de-camp to Lord Minier, has held a commission in the Life Guards, and for many a month has been sharing the dangers and hardships of the Russian army in Manchuria, the story of which has marked him as a descriptive writer of very high order.

Lord Willoughby, heir to the dukedom of Athol, is another strenuous young aristocrat, who turns his back on the butterfly life of society. The solitariness of a hunting life, the many a battle-field, he fought through the Nile expedition of some years ago, was in the thick of the battles of Atbara and Khartoum, added to his warlike laurels by gallant fighting in the South African war, and has won the D.S.O. and been four times commended in dispatches. The present Lord Loch, too, saw a great deal of fighting while still in the twenties, both in the Sudan and South Africa, and has reaped a rich harvest of honors.

Lord Finlay, heir to the Earl of Dunmore, has won laurels on a score of battle-fields in Dongola, Afghanistan, and South Africa, has served in India, won a name as a war correspondent, and the Victoria Cross by a splendid deed of daring. As he has been witness in war. But merely to enumerate the young aristocrats who have within recent years fought gallantly and faced hardships and death for their country would fill columns; they have proved the splendid potentiality of our peerage when duty calls them to stern things than spot and pleasure-seeking.

In politics, our building peers have proved themselves the equals of any. Lord Percy, heir to the dukedom of Northumberland, has been an ornament to the commons since he was twenty-four. He is a born statesman, a debater of great skill, of whom big things are expected, who has spent years in exploring the countries of the east. Lord Fitzwilliam is a model of energy and industry in his fellow-peers. He entered parliament at twenty-three and in a few years of zealous political work before he came to his title; he won his D.S.O. in South Africa, has travelled far and recognized authority on engineering.

Lord Ronaldshay, the Marquis of Zetland, is one of the greatest travellers of our time; he knows every corner of Ceylon, India and Persia, has written ably on Eastern politics, is an enthusiastic soldier, and has for years led the most adventurous of lives and faced hardships and dangers innumerable. Earl Beauchamp's activities have taken him to very different parts of the world. While still in the early twenties he was an energetic mayor of Worcester and member of the London school board, and at twenty-seven he was an Australian governor.

Lord Oswald's heir, Viscount Crawley, has made a name for himself in diplomacy, though he is still well on the right side of thirty; Viscount Tyrone, who is still only twenty-two, has been for some time member for Horsham, and is a keen and by no means passive politician; Lord Rosebery's two sons are also keen politicians and rising orators, especially the younger brother, of whom great things are expected; and the Hon. Charles Napier, in spite of his youth, holds a high position at the education office.

Lord Amthill, after doing doughty deeds as a university ordsman and providing over the union debates at Oxford, was little over thirty when he assumed the important office of governor of Madras. The Duke of Marlborough fought in South Africa in his twenties and was a minister of the crown at that time. It is still many that two other names out of many that occur to one, Lord Hugh Cecil and Winston Churchill have shown what splendid and varied activities can be crowded into the life of a young aristocrat long before thirty years are numbered.

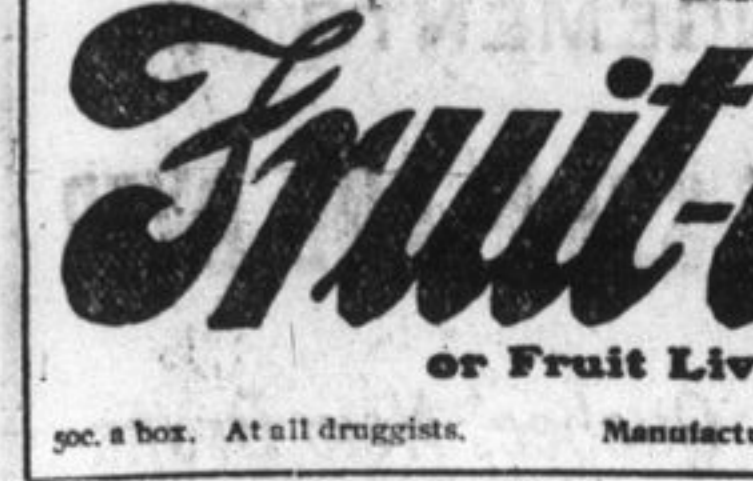
