COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What Is Going On In the Business World—The Markets.

The Standard Oil company has announced that it will manufacture and sell a new brand of kerosene in the United States. The directors of the company have decided to increase the capital of the company from \$12,000,000 to \$16,000,000.

For some time he had expressed a desire to enlist in the navy, and it is thought that that is his present intention. Chief of Police Baxter has telegraphed a description of the boy to Kingston, Ont., New York and Boston.

On The Up Grade.

The Kingston Reporter has been taken in hand vigorously by J. J. Hunter, formerly of the Whig force, and latterly of Toronto, where he was labor candidate in the provincial general election. The paper has been enlarged, a more modern press and outfit procured, and a general promise given of a lively, up-to-date, newsy journal.

Men Deserted At Quebec.

London, Sept. 18.—Advices have been received at Portsmouth that there were an abnormal number of desertions, chiefly sailors, from the squadron at Quebec. The number probably reaches one hundred.

THIRD SHOTS

Struck Fishing Tug—Vessel Flees From Cruiser.

WAS UNDER FIRE

FOR EIGHT MILES—ESCAPED TO YANKEE WATERS.

Had to Leave Nets Behind—Three Companion Fishermen Also Got Away—Cruiser Simply Hiddled the Law-Breaker.

Eric, Pa., Sept. 18.—The fourth of the fishing tug adventures in less than a week took place in mid-afternoon Sunday, when the Canadian cruiser Vigilant, with small shells from a rifle on the patrol boat.

Two fishermen were cut in the face by splinters shot away by the projectile.

The barburst, according to Capt. Fasel, was only five miles over the line drawing nets when the Vigilant appeared. The other Eric tugs, the Alma, Valiant and the Boyd, were at the chase started, and ran away when Capt. Dunn ordered the barburst to stop, but instead of doing so Captain Fasel put on full steam and started for the boundary line. He took a southeastward direction and could not be headed by the Vigilant.

It has become quite the custom for Eric fishermen to cross the line and engage in strict orders from the constable employing them and have exciting brushes with the Vigilant. Barhurst lost a large number of nets.

A LADY'S DEATH.

She Passed Away in Quebec, on Saturday.

Special to the Whig.—Mrs. L. J. Cannon, wife of Justice Cannon, died, on Saturday evening. She was forty-nine years old. The deceased lady, who recently only a few days with her father, died on an operation at the Victoria Hospital, on Friday last, and was doing as well as could be expected, when she took a turn for the worse, on Saturday afternoon, and died the same evening, surrounded by her husband and family. Mrs. Cannon was very well known in social circles, and was held in high esteem by a very large number of friends and acquaintances, her amiable disposition, and her kindly manner making her a great favorite to all who knew her.

GOOD RACING EXPECTED

At the Windsor Meet—500 Horses on Hand.

Windsor, Ont., Sept. 18.—A large number of horses have arrived here from Erie and Kenilworth, for the three weeks' racing meeting which opens on the 25th. It is expected that the fully 500 horses will be here by the middle of the week. In addition, the number will come here when the Woodbine meeting opens. Not only will there be a large number of horses, but the horses are also of a better class, and good racing is looked for.

Ready To Pay Penalty.

Pittsburg, Pa., Sept. 18.—John Fred Williams, a negro, twenty-nine years old, shot his way through the law, Charles Quince, and his brother-in-law, Charles Quince, Mrs. Quince died almost instantly of a wound in the breast, and Charles Quince is dying. Williams was at once arrested. He appeared pleased when he learned he had killed Mrs. Quince, and said he was ready to pay the penalty.

Sending Away 50,000.

London, Sept. 18.—On October 5th, 100 women and children, with other emigrants, under Salvation Army auspices, will sail for Canada. Gen. Booth has plans for the emigration of 21,000 workless at no distant date, and has already arranged for 5,000 for Australia. Of the rest, 1,000 will probably go to New Zealand, and the Argentine Republic share the remainder.

Dead In St. Louis.

St. Louis, Sept. 18.—Charles Parsons, born in Homer, N.Y., January 24th, 1824, is dead. He was the oldest banker in St. Louis, president of the State National Bank, and founder of a hospital. He was a grandson of Captain Charles Parsons of the Continental army.

FITH OF THE NEWS.

Will Be No More

LAND GRANTS ARE OVER SAID WHITNEY.

They Had Done No One Good Except the Speculators Said the Premier to a Deputation in Toronto.

Toronto, Sept. 18.—Premier Whitney to-day, to a deputation of over 100 members of the North-West field force, when asked that land grants similar to the other veterans be allowed them, said emphatically, that they might make up their mind that there would be no more land grants. The grants already made, under the veterans' land act, had tied up all the available land in New Ontario, and it would take ten years to finish squaring off the applications now in. Land grants had never done any one good except the speculators.

RELATIVES RELENT.

Mother and Sister Give Young Reymers \$250,000.

Pittsburg, Sept. 18.—Samuel S. Reymers, only son of Jacob Reymers, the Pittsburgh candy king, who was disinherited by his wealthy father, because he married against the latter's will, has just finished a conference with his mother and sister, to whom was left the fortune amounting to more than \$1,000,000, and will receive \$250,000.

Young Reymers, it will be remembered, married Nellie Paris, a carnival dancer, from a mining town in the Colorado hills country, and he had been forbidden by his father's house unless he broke off with his beautiful dancer. In a rage he went and married her on March 6th last. The father again, and he making his will a few days after the marriage, the candy king cut his son off with the interest of \$20,000 during his lifetime, after which it was to revert to the estate.

TO COST CHICAGO \$25,000,000.

Experts Say That is Minimum for Trolley Line.

Chicago, Sept. 18.—Mayor Dunne's proposed municipal railroad system for Chicago, involving the equivalent of 264 miles of single-track road, will cost, according to experts' estimates, about \$25,000,000. The figures are from the estimates of B. J. Arnold, the local expert employed by the council transportation committee to verify the estimates of A. B. Dupont, the Detroit expert who was employed by Mayor Dunne on the project.

SECOND TIME DESERTED.

Bridegroom Changed His Mind While She Waited.

Allentown, Pa., Sept. 18.—St. Lawrence Church was filled with guests and Miss Katharine Dent, the bride-elect, was already at the altar, Saturday, when Father Quinn, the rector, appeared and dismissed the assemblage by the statement that there would be no wedding. The intended bridegroom, John Ryan, was later explained, had changed his mind owing to pressure from his mother, who was violently opposed to the match. The bride upon her arrival at home tore up her wedding gown and a similar experience, the bridegroom-elect at that time being married and ascending on the day set for the nuptials.

ARRIVING IN QUEBEC.

Canadian Manufacturers Will Meet There.

Quebec, Sept. 18.—The members of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association are arriving in large numbers for the thirty-fourth annual convention of the organization which opens in the city to-day. About seventy-five arrived from Montreal by train and many will bring large detachments. Some of the most prominent manufacturers of the Dominion are expected to be present.

LIBELED BY CREW.

Sealing Steamer Held by Victoria Authorities.

Victoria, B.C., Sept. 18.—The sealing steamer Aspic and her catch of 265 sealskins, released by the collector of customs after a fine of \$1,000 was paid, have again been seized, this time by the admiralty court, in which five hunters and the cook have started a libel action for \$1,000, the amount of wages due them by virtue of an agreement with Capt. Alexander McLean to pay the hunters \$2 for each skin taken by them. The marshal is now in charge of the schooner and sealskins.
