Fall Of Another Idol.

The pictures of some men change, especially the pen pictures of them. In the biographies of the day none is more interesting than that of George W. Perkins, one of the partners of J. P. Morgan & Co., the great American mergers and syndicate men.

The story is told that Mr. Morgan, the keen-eyed financier, saw in Mr. Perkins something that suggested his real value, and offered him a place in the banking house at a princely income.

It has remained for Mr. Perkins to hand out his version of the case, and as an explanation of his peculiar relations as a representative of the New York Life and J. P. Morgan & Co. Mr. Perkins was called to a junior clerkship in the New York Life at the age of sixteen, by his father, an employee of the same company, and was promoted according as he improved in figuring and spelling. How he fulfilled expectations is indicated by his rapid rise until, as one of the vice-presidents, he commanded a salary of \$75,000.

It was then that Mr. Morgan let his eye rest on the gifted young man and made him an enticing offer. It was declined. He did not see his way clear to leave the New York Life, and he did not then think that he could serve two masters. He surmounted that difficulty later on, and stilled his conscience by accepting only \$25,000.

That was the first step towards his fall. The transactions referred to before the insurance committee are assuredly compromising. His trafficking in bonds, in a dual capacity, is, he says, all right. Is it? The chairman of the committee failed to see it. He could not understand how Mr. Perkins could be loyal to two institutions at one and the same time.

The Wall Street Journal is weary of Mr. Perkins' posturing and dual servings. There has already, it says, been too much of him in the New York Life's affairs. "If," says the North American, he is the standard of the men who manage the great financial institutions it is time there were retributions wrecked upon them, "lest in the end the people whose money is entrusted to them suffer while they are rich and insolent." As for Perkins, Hyde, and the other idols that have dropped into the obscurity that befits them.

Do The Utilities Pay?

The Montreal Gazette is not in favour of a public management of great enterprises. It cannot see in the public bodies generally the evidence of that economy and business ability which are essential to success.

It finds an occasion for a new outbreak in the declaration of the Galt Reporter, and to the effect that legislation should be sought to prevent the granting of a franchise to any electric lighting, water works, or gas company. Why? The council should not hesitate to go into the business itself. It can make money if there is to be made and it can be extracted by the company. This the Gazette pronounces rank socialism, and born of an idea that a municipal venture cannot be a failure. "As a matter of fact," says our contemporary, "the municipal ventures in the province of Ontario, which can be called successful, are few in number and unimportant. Their principal success has been in the invention of new and most mysterious methods of municipal book-keeping, designed for the purpose of hiding the errors of omission and commission of the municipal management."

There may be in some places a confusion of the accounts, but it cannot happen where the public utilities are protected from any invasion upon their interests and their funds. This invasion is the special danger when the moneys of the municipality go into the one box, or cash account, and where there is not care in keeping the accounts entirely separate. There is also the disposition of the council to "milk" the utilities they are supposed to protect to a certain extent. For instance, in Kingston, the council backed the bonds which made the water works' improvements, and the council took advantage of its power to cut down and almost of the sum it would pay annually for water service if the owners were other than the city. The council may presume to follow the same policy with regard to light, in order to secure the street lights for which people are clamoring, and every departure of this kind which is resorted to or attempted is a blow at municipal ownership.
