What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

Canada produced \$1,687,000 worth of lead in 1904. Every year the mint issues over 8,000,000 copper coins. Canada supplies 85 per cent. of the world's total product of corundum. The annual output of coal from the mines of India is nearly 8,000,000 tons. At Toronto the demand for hats is steady. Mr. J. H. Jones, who is at the head of the hat-making business in this city, has ordered for his factory, G.P.R., 14th, 1905, \$1,045,000 worth of goods for the year ending Sept. 14th, 1905, \$1,045,000 increase, \$112,000. Toronto railway earnings for the year ending September 18th, totaled \$7,885,51, or \$8,071.53 over the corresponding week of last year. This is Toronto's banner year in building. Last year a record with a total of \$5,500,000. This year the total is already over \$7,000,000. "Sox" Line's net earnings for the year ending June 30th, were \$4,214,000, an increase of \$967,350. Over 11 per cent was earned on the common stock. At Toronto the demand for hats is slow, but the undertone to the market is steady. The quote—choice Canadian hats at 25c, and fair to good at 22c to 24c per lb. The New York sugar market has declined 10c for all grades refined. Canadian prices are unchanged. We quote—Tinned, \$4.78; domestic, \$4.25. Sugar are quoted 5c less.

Want More Pay. The crew of the steamer Toronto, who are in the steward's department, are threatening to quit. The boat is being laid up at the dry dock wharf and the fittings expressed to Toronto. The help ask for the customary wages, \$1.25 per day for doing the work they have to board themselves. It seems the steward is willing that they should receive that amount but the chief at Montreal wants to continue the men on sailing wages.

Was Won By Queen's. Another bowling match between Queen's and Rockwood took place on the former's grounds yesterday afternoon. To use the words of a Portmouth player, "we brought in a team of lightweights and got what we deserved." It was a walk-over for the Queen's players.

TOOK HEART OUT

GREAT SURGICAL OPERATION AT PHILADELPHIA

Young Man Shot by a Policeman—The Bullet Grazed His Heart—His Complete Recovery Expected—Portions of Ribs Removed.

New York, Sept. 19.—A Philadelphia dispatch to The Herald says that the removal of a man's beating heart from his body and its replacement after a bullet had been extracted from the region adjacent to it have been accomplished by the physicians at the Germantown, Philadelphia, hospital. Frank Robinson, twenty-three years old, of Germantown, was shot on September 7th by Policeman Morley while the latter was trying to arrest him. The bullet entered Robinson's chest on the left side. He was hurried to the Germantown hospital, where it was believed his heart had been struck. Some of the most eminent physicians at the hospital were called into consultation. Portions of the ribs were removed, exposing the heart to view. No evidence of a bullet could be seen, so the surgeon, with great care, partially removed the organ from the body. The bullet was found immediately behind in the flesh within a fraction of an inch of the heart, upon which it had caused pressure. The heart was then replaced and the ribs returned and covered with flesh. There is every probability that Robinson will entirely recover.
