COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

It is reported that several Winnipeg firms will open branches in Edmonton. The South Portland Cement company, of New York, will establish an agency in the largest cement plant in Ontario, with a capacity of 5,000 barrels a day. The Bell Telephone company of Canada, has telegraphed a quarterly dividend of two per cent. payable October 10th, to shareholders on record on September 30th.

Neo Paulo net earnings for the year ended June 30th, were \$4,214,016, an increase of \$207,227. The surplus in 1914 was \$1,070,000. After paying 7 per cent. on the preferred, over 11 per cent. was earned on the common stock.

HE WILL RUN AGAIN. MAYOR LAPORTE IS IN FIELD FOR OFFICE.

Thomas D. Bell Was Mentally Deranged—Sir Frederick Pollock is on a Visit to This Country.

Special to the Whig. Montreal, Sept. 22.—Mayor Laporte, to-day, definitely announced that, all agitation and movements to the contrary notwithstanding, he would be a candidate for the election next civic elections.

The coroner's jury, to-day, returned a verdict of suicide, while mentally deranged, in the case of Thomas D. Bell, a well known commission merchant, who hanged himself last evening.

MILLIONS FOR CHARITY. Baron Nathaniel Rothschild's Liberal Provision.

London, Sept. 22.—The will of Baron Nathaniel Rothschild, who died in Vienna on June 12th, was probated in London, yesterday. The baron bequeathed over \$5,000,000 to charity, chiefly devoted to the relief of sufferers from chronic incurable maladies.

THE TURBINA RESPONSIBLE. For Collision in Toronto Bay, With Primrose.

Toronto, Sept. 22.—Judgment was handed out, this morning, by Commander Spain, in the case of the steamer Turbina, which plies between Hamilton and Toronto, responsible for the collision with the ferry steamer Primrose, in Toronto Bay a few weeks ago, and suspends the certificate of Capt. Bonnard for nine months from August, the date of the accident.

IN A BAD STATE. Only One Well in the Famous Town.

ONE INSTANCE. Of Rejoicing Over the Peace Treaty.

MURDER OF SYRIAN WOMAN. Reported From Labelle County, Quebec.

Special to the Whig. Ottawa, Sept. 22.—A Syrian woman is supposed to have been murdered at Nominique, a village in Labelle county, Quebec, last Monday. Word was received this morning, by the Hull authorities, that an investigation will be made to determine if there has been any blood stains on the road near the village and a long lock of black hair, dotted with blood, is reported to have been found. Rumor spread that the decapitated body had been found in the Longue river, near the village, but it was unfounded.

DISCOVERED NEW PLANET. Satellite Located Between Mercury and Sun.

Alexandria, Sept. 22.—Prof. Turner, Savilian professor of astronomy at Oxford, who headed the British expedition to Egypt, and sailed for England on September 13th, before leaving, published a memoir of the results achieved by various missions. From this it would not be surprising if the world learned soon that Prof. Hussey, of the Lick Observatory, has achieved the distinction of having discovered a new planet between Mercury and the sun.

SPANIARDS ARE EMIGRATING. Families Abandon Their Homes and Farms.

Madrid, Sept. 22.—Despatches from the famine districts of Andalusia say that entire trains of emigrants are leaving to embark for South America. Many families are abandoning their homes and farms. Some villages in Galicia have been totally deserted through despair of receiving the promised relief. The steamship companies announce that fifteen steamers loaded with emigrants will leave Andalusian ports in October. The press urging the government to adopt energetic measures against wholesale emigration.

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GREAT FIND OF OAK WILL RAISE RAFT SUBMERGED SEVENTY YEARS.

Joseph Demister's White Oak Timber Caught in Ice in Lake Scouog, Long Ago, Now Worth \$1,000,000—Grandson to Raise It.

Special to the Whig. Windsor, Ont., Sept. 22.—About seventy years ago, Joseph Demister, one of the big lumber dealers of his day, started a raft of white oak logs down the Lindsay river so late in the season that it was caught in the ice in Lake Scouog, and sunk. For some reason or other the raft was never located.

N. W. Trimble, a grandson of Demister, who until recently resided at Elmstead, in this county, spent nearly a year in a quiet hunt for the raft, which lies under thirty feet of water and embedded in the mud. About a month ago he was successful in locating the object of his search. This, he says, contains several thousand sticks of white oak, cut and squared, each stick contains about 100 cubic feet, worth at the present one dollar per cubic foot. There are probably one million dollars worth of timber in the raft.

Mr. Trimble will remove to the location of Lake Scouog, where he will remain until the work of removing the logs is completed. He will use barges with tackle and hoisting engines to pull out the logs.

UNIONISM A SICK MAN. Says a Delegate to Trades Congress.

Special to the Whig. Toronto, Sept. 22.—At this morning's meeting of the trades and labor congress the appointment of an organizer was left to the new executive. The maritime provinces were not considered to be doing their share for the union cause. The inactivity of Quebec was regretted, and one delegate declared that unionism was a "sick man."

President Verville said that what was wanted in Quebec was an organizer to affiliate unions. They had the national movement to fight there. Of 1,300 international unions in Canada, only 350 are affiliated out of the congress.

The financial report showed a balance of \$698, the receipts amounting to \$4,763. The membership is slightly over 22,000.

A resolution, by Delegate Anderson, criticizing the increase of military armaments by the government as nurturing a class of parasites was not concurred in. Officers for the coming year will be elected this afternoon.

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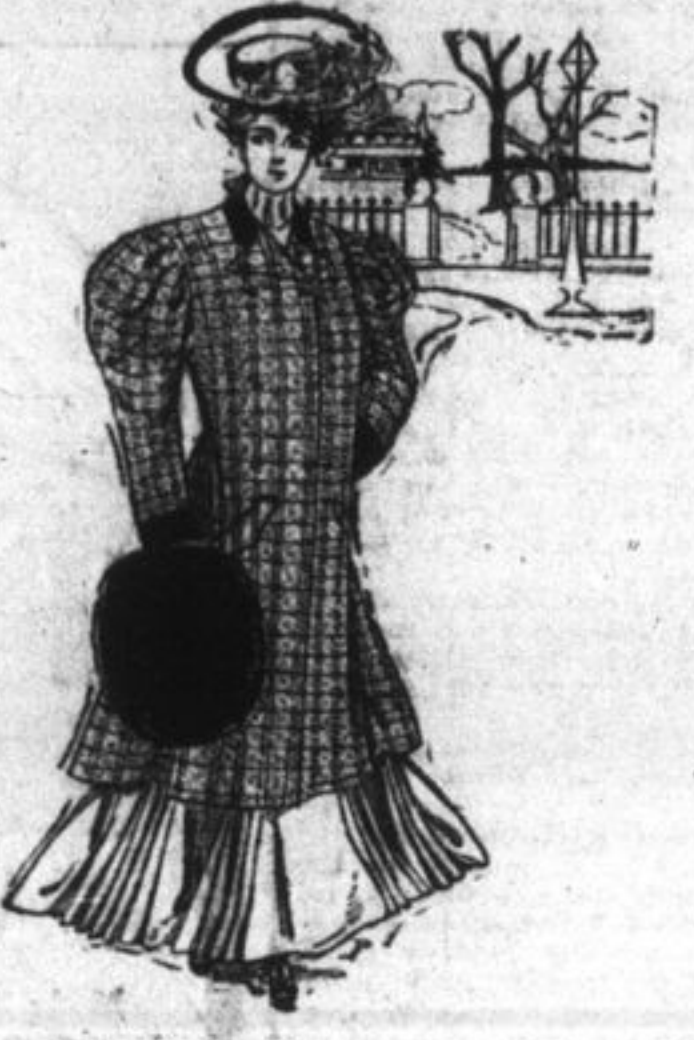
