WHAT'S THE REASON?

Sympathy for Japan, Changed to Pro-Russian. Special to the Whig. Now, that the peace conference is a thing of the past and the plenipotentiaries of Japan and Russia have left for their respective countries, the question is puzzling many philosophical observers, why it was that even since Mr. Witte, the Russian plenipotentiary, landed in New York, a complete reversal of public sentiment took place. The former open preference for the Japanese government, the decided pro-Russian sentiment. What caused that change? Before the arrival of Mr. Witte every reference to the war and to the remarkable successes of the Japanese on land and sea evoked the most pronounced enthusiastic demonstrations in favor of the Japanese. All that seemed to be forgotten as soon as Mr. Witte appeared upon the scene. This complete reversion of psychological problem. It must be admitted that Russia as a nation had done nothing to bring about that change. The military operations in Asia were practically at a standstill and there was nothing in the reports from the seat of war that could have influenced the public mind in this country, one way or the other. The only explanation that offers itself is that the change was merely due to the personality of the Russian plenipotentiary. Comparatively little was known of Mr. Witte before he arrived here and even less of Mr. Komura. Both were accepted as great men with their own personal characteristics, selected for their important mission because of their eminent fitness. In that respect there was no advantage on either side. But, it is a striking fact that Mr. Witte made more friends for himself and for Russia in one day than Baron Komura during his entire stay in this country. The Americans are a peculiar nation. Social brilliancy, approachableness, joviality and conviviality are characteristics which the Americans admire and the lack of which they resent. That this feeling exists in this country is proven by the exaggerated manner in which it is found in certain sections of the country which are still in a rather primitive state of civilization. To refuse to drink with a man is considered an insult in the west and south and in the Bowery. Did Mr. Witte know that, when he made himself so sociable at a ball his frankness soon won him many friends, although he could not speak a word of English? Baron Komura, although a Harvard graduate and thoroughly familiar with the English language, made few, if any, friends. He kept himself aloof from contact with the people and sacrificed his popularity to what he considered the dignity of his mission.

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METHODISTS GASP

OLD-TIMERS STICK AT INTONING "AMEN."

Secular Writers Appear—Roman Catholics and Unitarians Also Mingle Their Cadences With Those of John Wesley. New York Herald.

Old-time Methodists gasped in amazement when they looked over the new hymnal of their church, which was yesterday seen for the first time in their houses of worship.

There were new hymns by writers who had no degree in divinity, and the composers were of the modern school, who gave a decidedly florid touch to many of the scores. Every hymn ended in "Amen," a fact which had already caused communicants of the old school to protest, for they declare that such a finale is ritualistic and is too much like the services of the Roman Catholic and Protestant Episcopal churches.

First to test the new hymnal was Calvary church, Seventh avenue and 128th street. Among the innovations there was a new tune for H. Heber's "The Son of God," composed by Henry F. Cutler. Another musical setting, that by Spencer Lane, was also provided for "In the Hour of Trial."

Among those who are not famed as religious writers yet who are well represented in the hymnal are John Greenleaf Whittier, William Cullen Bryant, Mrs. Browning Sidney and Sir Walter Scott, and Dr. J. G. Holland. John Wesley still has the principal place among the sacred music writers, and Isaac Watts has many hymns credited to him yet. It is noted that all of the writers whose names are told of an avenging God have been retired and that there is a general note of cheerfulness pervading the volume.

A Noble Family Record. The death of Lady Hobhouse (whose husband's barony became extinct at his death five months ago), recalls the fact that the late peer and his immediate relatives formed a remarkable group of persons enabled, not by decent, but by their individual achievements in various careers. Lady Hobhouse's brother was created Baron Palmer twelve years ago; her brother-in-law was the first Earl of Idelburgh, raised to the peerage two years later; her husband became Lord Hobhouse in 1885; her nephew is the first Lord Northbrook, and at present governor-general of Australia; and her father, Sir William Palmer, received a knighthood in Queen Victoria's Jubilee year. The family record is certainly one to be proud of.

A Hearty Veteran. Billings Amey, Ernestown, aged eighty-six years, carries his years like the average man of sixty, and helped in the harvest the past summer. He is a veteran of 1837, and served in Kingston in that year. His company was ordered to Prescott, where they all arrived at the wharf, an incoming boat announced the result of the battle of the Windmill, and landed thirteen American prisoners, all bound with one rope.
