AN AMERICAN TRAIT

RECKLESSNESS A PRONOUNCED CHARACTERISTIC.

The United States People Will Take Desperate Chances—Reckless With Their Own and Others' Lives.

New York, Sept. 23.—Recklessness is one of the most pronounced American characteristics. To some extent the human race everywhere is inclined to be reckless, but nowhere is this tendency so strongly developed as in this country. Perhaps ninety-nine per cent. of the accidents which happen every year are, to a certain extent, attributable to recklessness. The Americans will take chances, frequently desperate chances. It is true, we are surrounded by dangers on every side and at all times and it is also true that familiarity with dangers breeds contempt and leads to recklessness. Thousands are killed every year by being crushed in elevators, torn by machinery or run over by vehicles, but every day in the

year some fools will take the most desperate chances with elevators, machinery or vehicles. Just think of the appalling list of fatalities caused every year by our idiotic method of celebrating the Fourth of July; think of the hundreds of fools drowned every year because they insisted in going in to deep water without being able to swim; think of the scores killed every year by guns that were supposed to be not loaded. It would not be so had it not been for the recklessness of individuals who endanger their lives alone. But that is not always the case. In many cases such persons are reckless with the lives of other persons, as in the case of the switchman of the elevated road, who left his post during the rush hour and, through his carelessness caused a terrible accident. It seems that of an example should be made of persons whose recklessness causes loss of life or injury to others. It may not altogether stop others from taking chances, but may have at least some beneficial effect.

A Strange Farm.

Though not included in the reports on this subject, undoubtedly, the most remarkable agricultural enterprise in the country is the farm in Southern Florida on which the one crop cultivated is alligators.

This unique farm is located on the east coast of Florida, some distance between Palm Beach, on the bank of the Indian river. The situation is an excellent one for the purpose, for it is in the very part of the country where the saltwaters were the most numerous in the days before they began to be hunted as a business, and not far away are the Everglades where the few remaining specimens (that is, few when compared with the tens of thousands that were to be found in Florida waters twenty years ago) are being relentlessly pursued to extinction by their fellow swamp-dwellers, the Seminoles.

Long Arm of The Law.

On an order for the maintenance of a child made against him thirty-eight years ago, William Onslow was summoned at Wolverhampton. The mother procured in court the original order, black with age. Onslow never paid anything on the order, and was summoned for £54, arrears up to the time of the woman's marriage, twenty-four years ago. She declared that Onslow had plenty of money. He was sentenced to three months' hard labor.

A GREAT GATHERING

WILL BE HELD IN NEW YORK IN NOVEMBER.

Will Be Known as Inter-Church Conference on Federation—Delegates Named, Officially, From All Bodies.

New York, Sept. 23.—About the middle of November there will be held in this city one of the most important religious gatherings that ever met in this part of the country. The meeting will be known officially as the Inter-Church Conference on Federation and will hold its first session in Carnegie hall on November 15th. It will be the first conference in the religious history of the United States to which delegates have been named officially by the various Protestant denominations. Previous joint conferences on missions and other topics have been unofficial in character. The conference will, in no wise, mean an attempt to bring the various religious bodies of the country into organic union. All that the leaders hope is that the conference may create a permanent organization of the churches, which will bring them into better and closer relations than ever before existed. It is hoped that an organization may be formed that will voice the attitude of the united Protestant churches on all great questions of a religious, social, ethical and economic character.

A Mock Funeral In Cornwall.

In the course of a trial in the divorce court in London, a witness stated that the behavior of the respondent created a great scandal in the village of Bugle, near St. Austell, where they lived. In September, 1898, they were buried in effigy. The correspondent, though he was one of the parties to the suit, buried himself (laughter) and supplied the beer for those present. Among them was a man who assumed the part of the clergyman, a choir, a number of mourners and an undertaker.

Justice Deane—And this was in Cornwall?

The funeral took place in a field at the back of the house. The police were also there, but the funeral was on private property. Counsel said he had a copy of the deed and the respondent stated that "with the greatest decorum." There was an enormous attendance, and the ceremony passed off with the greatest circumstance. There were no signs of revelry, and the only sound was copious mourning on the part of the mourners. The affair took place at nine at night.

Preacher And Soldier.

A correspondence has recently taken place between Colonel Mainwaring, commanding the 23rd Regimental District, and Dr. Ellis Edwards, Principal of the North Wales Theological College, Bala, with reference to some remarks made during a sermon at a chapel in Rhosanechrog, near Wrexham, by J. O. Jones, of Penmaelno, one of the students of the college. Mr. Jones is reported to have said that the majority of soldiers were men of no principle, too lazy for anything, physically or mentally. Among the congregation was a sergeant-instructor named Morris, of the Royal Welsh Fusiliers, who immediately rose, and as a protest, walked out with his children. Colonel Mainwaring, in drawing Principal Edwards' attention to Mr. Jones' remarks, added that he was confident the sentiments expressed were not those held by the college. Dr. Edwards replied that he deeply regretted the remarks made by Mr. Jones, and that he would bring the subject before him when the next college session commenced. The matter rests for the present.

England's Oldest Inn.

There is a discussion in the English papers as to which is the oldest inn in England. A writer in the Estates Magazine thinks the Ostrich, at Colbrook, Middlesex, is one of the oldest. There is every reason to believe it has been in existence 700 years, and even then took the place of an earlier inn burned down by Henry I, in consequence of the misdeeds of the tenant. The story of the Seven Stars, in Manchester, can be traced clearly back to 1356. Its existence as a licensed house dates down to that year. Among the relics of the Seven Stars is an old clock which has stood at the top of the staircase for more than two hundred years.
