SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not eserved, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which he land to be taken is situated, or if the tion to the Minister of the Interior. Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigra-tion, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situate, receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

HOMESTEAD DUTIES: A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one the following plans :

(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of any person who is \$6.50. eligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this Act, resides Fan spon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by ich person residing with

BRITAIN WITH CANADIAN WHEAT.

Three North-West Provinces Alone Could Produce Enough for Canadian Consumption and Have Three Times What Eng- October 30th. land Requires Left Over.

Ottawa, Sept. 22.-Dr. Saunders, director of experimental farms, wires the agricultural department from Brandon that after seeing the large area of the North-West he must sav the crops are immense and the possi bilities of wheat-growing in Canada are very great. He adds that the figures given in his pamphlet on wheatgrowing are well within the mark. That is to say that one-fourth of the Montreal. in Manitoba and the two new provinces is suitable for cultivation, and that with a production equal to the average of Manitoba, during the last ten seasons the total crop of the three provinces would be over 812, 000,000. This would be ample to supply the home demand for thirty mil lions of inhabitants and to satisfy the present need of Great Britain three times over. In this estimate no account is taken of Eastern Canada.
