What is Going On in the Business World.—The Markets. Over \$2,000,000 of dividend money will be distributed in Canada next month. The total capital stock of John Berryman & Co., Toronto, is increased from \$500,000 to \$600,000. The Northwest Colonization Company, St. Paul, has purchased 250,000 acres in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. A Toronto broker figures that Twin City this year will earn from 6 to 6 1/2 per cent on the common stock, while Detroit will earn from 7 1/2 to 8 per cent. The largest mass of pure rock salt in the world lies under the province of Galicia, Hungary. It is known to be 500 miles long, 30 miles broad, and 20 feet in thickness. Another fire insurance company has made its appearance in the business world. This company is the Sovereign Fire Assurance Company of Canada, and has been incorporated with a capital of two million dollars. Farmers in Northern New York who have just begun to dig potatoes are alarmed at the prevalence of rot. The conditions are so serious that some farmers whose yield gave promise of 250 to 250 bushels to the acre have abandoned their fields entirely because the few sound potatoes would not pay for digging. As potato rotting is the most important farming industry in the most fertile New York, the loss of the major portion of the crop will be serious.

Now Horse Artillery. The recently promulgated general order announcing the conversion of "A" and "B" batteries, Kingston, into horse artillery, has just appeared. The men of these two corps received the news with considerable pleasure, as the change is really a corps promotion and will give the two batteries the right of the line in all ceremonial parades. The order states nothing about a change of uniforms, though it is probable that will follow in the adoption of the R.H.A. dress, as used in England, with, of course, an adaptation in detail to the Canadian corps. The R. H. A. uniform is one of the most gorgeous in the service. The two batteries mentioned are already equipped with horse artillery guns, and a powder breech loading. Further changes to comply with the order will be made in supplying remounts and mounting all the gunners. The two batteries will now be known as Royal Canadian Horse Artillery. Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, former chancellor of the exchequer in Great Britain, sailed from Yokohama for Singapore.

ATROCIOUS CONDUCT AFRICAN NATIVES HANGED BY GERMAN TROOPS.

Cape Argus Makes Charges.—Officers of French Congo Also Charged With Acting Barbarously Towards Natives. Cape Town, Sept. 26.—The Argus publishes allegations of atrocious conduct on the part of German troops in German Southwest Africa. The Argus publication contains statements made and signed by Boers. The acts of cruelty alleged include the hanging and shooting of native women and children as spies, and the shooting of natives wounded in battle, as not worth succoring. French Congo Cruelties. Paris, Sept. 26.—The report of the late Count de Brazza upon his investigation of charges against officers of the French Congo, is said by the Matin to contain grave charges against the governor-general, Emile Gentil. The Matin says that the minister of the colonies must either countermand the order for a national funeral in honor of the explorer's memory or sign the dismissal of the accused governor-general. The cruelties alleged against the latter include hanging up women by their feet till they died, and ordering negroes to eat the memory of the explorer. It is said that he is responsible for the sacrifice of an enormous number of natives. BLANCHE WALKER. Daughter of Sergt. Walker, Stanley Barracks. Singapore is Great Britain's key to the door of China. A Fireman Killed. Toronto Junction, Ont., 26.—Norman Morley, aged twenty-four, C. P. R. fireman, son of R. P. Morley, of this city, was killed, yesterday afternoon, in a head-on collision between pit and ballast engines at Waldemar, on the Tresswarr branch of the C. P. R. Engineer Dunman jumped and escaped unhurt. Conductor Odell also escaped injury but Conductor David Carson, Toronto Junction, on the other train, sustained injuries to one of his shoulders and two brakemen were slightly injured. Fireman Morley saw service to South Africa with the 1st contingent of Toronto Mounted Rifles and had previously served on Admiral Howell's flag ship San Francisco during the Spanish-American war. Victory is certain for President Palma at Havana, in the December elections. Employees of the Cumberland coal and railway company, at Springfield, N.S., are out on strike for higher wages. The Kansas City State Bank, Wiley O. Cox, president, failed to open its doors, having gone into voluntary liquidation. The cornerstone of the new First Presbyterian church building at Port Hope, was laid by Rev. Dr. Armstrong, of Ottawa. Thieves stole nearly 3300 worth of copper wire from the Toronto and Niagara Power company that was lying on the Hamilton Beach. The new St. Michael's church, Belleville, will be dedicated by Archbishop Gauthier on October 15th. It will be a beautiful edifice when completed. Two new cases of cholera and two deaths occurred in Germany, from noon, Sunday, to noon Monday, making the totals 246 cases and 85 deaths. The C. P. R. will add a new wing to the Chateau Frontenac, Quebec. The Bank of Montreal will also put up a new savings branch in the Ancient Capital. James P. Hennessy, a clerk, who recently confessed to stealing \$400,000 from the estate of D. Percy Morgan, New York, was sentenced to state prison for seven years. Nellie Natusbaum, New York, fifteen years old, was accused by her father of writing him letters threatening death unless he paid her \$50. They were signed "The Black Hand." Nellie confessed, saying it was "just for fun." At Fortage La Prairie, Man., a half-breed named Henderson is under arrest charged with assaulting Mrs. Sinclair, for whom he was working. He beat her into unconsciousness with a hammer. William W. Harvey, twenty-seven years old, living at Harper's Field, Ohio, shot and killed his wife and then killed himself. Harvey had been confined in an insane asylum in Cleveland, but escaped a few days ago on a canoe home. By the explosion of a quantity of powder the fireworks factory of Joseph Speizo, Green Point, N.Y., was destroyed. Speizo's sixteen-year-old son was instantly killed, and his wife, two younger boys and a workman were seriously injured. The explosion shook buildings a mile away. MINING MEN TO MEET And Suggest Changes in the Mining Laws. Toronto, Sept. 26.—With a view of aiding the government in the work of the next session of the legislature a proper revision of the mining laws, mining men are being asked by the districts to hold local meetings and place themselves on record as to what changes in the laws they think desirable. They will be asked also to name delegates if they see fit, who may meet in general convention, to be held at parliament buildings about middle of November, to discuss the resolutions adopted by the local meetings. The mining centres where local meetings are likely to be held are: Kingston, Madoc, Haldimand, Sudbury, Sault Ste. Marie, Port Arthur, Kenora and Fort Francis. FOR SMALL-POX CASES. In Toronto—To Hunt for Man Who Spread Disease. Toronto, Sept. 26.—Four cases of small-pox have been removed to the Swiss Cottage hospital here. All are traceable to a man who came to visit here during the fair. One of the patients, a young girl, is in a serious condition. The others are an old lady and two men. Dr. Sheard has asked the provincial authorities to look the man up who spread the contagious disease. The case was diagnosed as chicken pox in the town from which the man came and the physicians pronounced him to have chicken pox. No Letter, Takes Poison. St. John, N.B., Sept. 26.—A great sensation was created in King Square yesterday when Annie Craft, aged twenty-two, took a dose of poison while sitting in one of the public seats. She fell over and was taken to the hospital, and is now at the point of death. She said she was disappointed in not getting an expected letter.
