GARB OF A CORPSE

DRAMATIC ESCAPE OF SWINDLER FROM GUIANA.

Must Return to Prison-Frenchman Was Recognized in Paris and is Again to Face Penal Servitude.

Paris, Sept. 26.-Details of the extraordinary escape from the almost impregnable French convict settlement in French Guiana have been disclosed by the capture of Joseph Sporn, a swindler, who, after eight years of liberty, will soon be on his way back to French Guiana.

The story was announced in 1896 to eight years' hard labor and twenty years' exile for theft. The year after his deportation to French Guiana he was cutting rushes by the river side, gradually wandered out of sight of a warden, when he saw floating down the river the corpse of a sailor, who he knew had been murdered by some of his fellow-convicts a few days before.

Sporn secured the corpse, changed clothes, and sent it down the steamship, dressed in his convict garb. Then he made tracks toward the river's mouth. There he saw a small Dutch steamer, and made desperate signs that he wanted help. A boat was put off, and he was taken on board, where, in broken German, he told the captain that he had been shipwrecked, and wanted to get back either to Holland or Dutch Guiana.

Sporn left the ship at Venezuela. There he made some money in business. Like all Frenchmen, the temptation to return to Paris was strong, and he succumbed. He went into business, however, attracted the attention of the police, and he was taken to headquarters to explain. There a detective recognized him. He is now in Sapry Prison, and in a few days will join a convoy of convicts being sent back to Guiana.

AWFUL TRAGEDY IN TUNNEL.

Young Woman Murdered and Thrown From the Car.

London, Sept. 27.-The Mertham tunnel on the London and South-Eastern railway, where the brutal murder of Frederick I. Gold by Percy Lefroy, alias Mapleton, occurred June 27th, 1884, has again been the scene of a mysterious tragedy, the details of which so far are unascertained, are curiously similar to that of a quarter of a century ago. In the present case the victim is a young woman, Mary Money, whose body was horribly mutilated. A long veil was tightly wedged in her mouth, and the police are confident she was murdered in the compartment of a train on which she was travelling, and her body thrown from the car. The fact that all the doors of the train on its arrival at Red Hill were closed is considered to prove conclusively that it was not a case of suicide. Miss Money left her home on Sunday evening saying she would not be gone long.

THIS WORM HAS FEATHERS.

A Poisonous Bite, as Many Can Testify.

Asheville, N.C., Sept. 27.-A feathered worm has made its appearance in different parts of the state, and a few months ago it has been made very ill by its bite. The insect is not unlike a white earth worm, but has a covering of brown down, similar to that of a young bird. Its bite is so poisonous that in a few minutes after receiving the wound the victim swells enormously and displays symptoms not unlike those of snake bite. The worm feeds on maple trees and rose bushes. Its presence on the latter accounts for the number of women victims. No one is able to classify the insect. Several specimens are being prepared for shipment to Washington for examination to establish its identity.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any one availing himself of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, exceeding 8 and 20, not covered, may be homesteaded under person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less. Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, (1) take the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situated, receive authority for some one to make entry for him. (2) If the settler is a settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months residence upon said cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years. (2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this Act, resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for such person, residing within the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with his father or mother. (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. APPLICATION FOR PATENT should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or Homestead Inspector. Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands, and also give notice to do so.
