WHOLE WORLD

Driven By Britain Into Enemies' Camp.

ROARS TAGEBLATT

ANGERED BY ANGLO-JAPANESE TREATY.

Must Be Coalition of Powers to Counteract Its Effect—Is a Menace to All European Countries, Says Germany.

Berlin, Sept. 28.—The new Anglo-Japanese treaty is received with little favor in Germany. The government, through the indirect channels which it uses at need, intimates that it does not see anything objectionable in the terms, which indeed guarantee the maintenance of the essential principle of Germany's own policy in the far east, but the newspapers express an entirely different view. They declare that the treaty is highly detrimental to German interests, and to Germany's position in the world. The Tageblatt condemns the treaty as a menace to the interests of all European countries, and says that a coalition of the powers, whose Asiatic interests are threatened, will now necessarily be called into existence to counteract the effects of the treaty. It adds that Great Britain has abandoned her splendid isolation, only to drive the world into the camp of her enemies.

Several journals seek to spread the idea that the alliance is an unequal bargain, in which Japan gives everything in return for the alliance. In conversation, the opinion is expressed that Lord Lansdowne has achieved a masterpiece of diplomacy.

A Continental Alliance.

London, Sept. 28.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Standard says it is an indisputable fact that German diplomacy is exceedingly active. The consensus of opinion is that the Kaiser is urging the czar to form a continuing alliance to offset the Anglo-Japanese alliance.

Chagrined and Indignant.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 28.—Politicians, military men and officials, whose creed is Russian expansion, are chagrined and indignant over the Anglo-Japanese treaty. They declare it is preposterous that England and Japan should arrogate to themselves the prerogative of arbiters of the fate of the whole of Asia. It is generally supposed, however, there are some secret clauses in the treaty. The expression, "defence of Asia," being taken to be too indefinite for a full text.

Tokio Undermotive.

Tokio, Sept. 28.—Tokio received the publication of the text of Anglo-Japanese treaty of alliance without any demonstration. The Kokumai argues that Great Britain's explicit recognition of Japan's protectorate over Korea, is a fair equivalent for the new burden of India upon Japan. The majority of the people show no enthusiasm.

France Receives It Calmly.

Paris, Sept. 28.—The Anglo-Japanese treaty is widely commented upon here. The official view is that the treaty is conformable to French interests. The officials are hopeful that the treaty will prove satisfactory to Russia, but there appears to remain some doubt as to Russia's complete acquiescence.

ACCUSED OF CRIME.

An Elopement at Detroit—The Man Arrested. Detroit, Mich., Sept. 28.—Robert H. French, proprietor of the Ryall house, Lexington, Ont., is under arrest at Bowling Green, Ohio, charged with adultery. Russell left Detroit, on Tuesday night, for Toledo, with the wife of W. B. Ireland, a roofer of this city. Russell is Mrs. Ireland's uncle by marriage. He had been paying a great deal of attention to the woman for some time, and Ireland has begun suit against him for \$20,000 for alienating of his wife's affections. Officers were unable to find him before the elopement. An officer has gone to Bowling Green to bring Russell back here.

TO QUELL THEM.

A Flying Force Has Gone to Basutoiland. London, Sept. 28.—It is stated that a flying force left Pretoria, on September 26th, for the border of Basutoiland, where since the death of Leretodi, paramount chief, and the report of the last German defeat in South-West Africa, the Basutos have been restless and a warlike feeling has been simmering on a boiling creek since May 1st. STANDS OVER

Division of Keewatin Not Proceeded With.

TO HAVE LAW SUIT TO SETTLE THE QUESTION OF BOUNDARIES.

Quebec Will Appeal to the Courts to Decide Width of Newfoundland's Strip of Labrador—Friction Over Lumber Licenses.

Ottawa, Sept. 28.—It is hardly likely that the conference of the provinces with the Dominion government over the question of a re-arrangement of territory to the north will take place for some months yet. The new provinces, Alberta and Saskatchewan, are interested, but until their organization is completed they will not be able to take part. Representatives of most of the provinces expect to meet, the federal government this fall and discuss the subsidies question.

Feeling that it is desirable to have the boundary between the province of Quebec and Newfoundland's coast strip along the Labrador peninsula clearly defined, the Quebec government, with the approval of the federal authorities, will shortly take steps to have the subject brought in the courts. Newfoundland has for some time been issuing timber licenses in the interest of Labrador. Premier Golin's intention is to have some of this timber seized, after which the courts will be asked to issue the licenses under which the lumbermen operate. The case will be tried first in the superior court and no doubt appealed to the judicial committee of the privy council.

Commends Labors for Railroad Rate Legislation.

Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 28.—W. J. Bryan has written another letter to President Roosevelt. He says in part: "You have the contest of your life before you, and I desire to render you all the assistance in my power. You have asked congress to enact a law enlarging the powers of the Interstate Commerce Commission as to permit it to fix and enforce a reasonable freight rate, and the railroad lobby was strong enough to stop in the senate the bill passed by the house. The railroad magnates expect to block the passage of the bill again.

"Stand by your guns. You have developed a reform element in republican parties. You must lead it or suffer the humiliation of seeing the leadership pass to some one else.

"Go forward! You owe it to yourself. You owe it your party. And more than all you owe it to your country."

ADVANCE IN RATES

On Lumber, Via the Williams Barge Route.

Toronto, Sept. 28.—Notice was given this morning of an advance on the transportation of lumber, via the Williams barge route from Georgian Bay, and points north, via Albany, to New York. Lumber over this route is shipped over the G.T.R. and Delaware and Hudson, being floated from Albany on barges. The previous rate of \$4 per thousand is advanced to \$4.25 from Georgian Bay ports, with a corresponding increase from points further north. The new rate comes into effect October 2nd, and shipments will not be accepted after October 15th.

KIDNAPPING IS CHARGED.

Real Estate Dealer With Bill of Sale Arrested.

Kaukauna, Wis., Sept. 28.—Wenzel E. Cavote, a real estate dealer, of Green Bay, was arraigned on a charge of kidnapping M. M. McCarty, a prominent farmer of the town of Kaukauna, who has been missing since September 14th. McCarty lived alone. His property was valued at \$17,000. When last seen he said he was going to Green Bay. After he had been missing about a week Cavote appeared on McCarty's farm with a bill of sale and began disposing of the stock. The instrument is in McCarty's handwriting.

Winnipeg, Sept. 28.—Malcolm McMillan, of the Donald McMillan company, has just made a contract to do some of the heaviest work in laying the lines to Portage la Prairie and Touchwood Hills. The Donald McMillan company has, for some years, employed a number of Doukhobors in the railway building operations and has a high opinion of the capacity of these people for such work.

Fell From the Bridge. Ingersoll, Ont., Sept. 28.—The body of Isaac Wright, well known colored resident of this town for many years, was this morning, found in the Thames river, not far from the street bridge. Wright had been missing for the past few days. It is believed he fell from the bridge, and was drowned. He leaves a widow and two children.

The Vessel Blown Up. Port Said, Sept. 28.—The British steamer Chatham, sunk in the canal on September 6th, because she was afire and a quantity of dynamite in her hold threatened to explode, was blown up this morning. The wreckage now entirely blocks the canal and all traffic has been stopped. It is believed little damage was done to the canal.

A REMARKABLE CASE. Yonkers, N.Y., Sept. 28.—Jacob Litt, the theatrical manager, died yesterday. Mr. Litt was forty-two years old and was the owner of the Broadway theatre in New York.
