

GREAT DISASTER You Won't

BLOWING UP OF TIOGA AT CHICAGO.

Twenty-Eight Men Were Killed Outright Now Captain Phelps is Called to Chicago as Witness in Suit Still Pending. Watertown, N.Y., Standard. An echo of one of the worst steam-

boat disasters in the shape of an explosion that ever occurred on the upper lakes is reverberated after fifteen years by the receipt by Captain Austin A. Phelps, Dexter, A.Y., of a communication from the steamboat company owning the boat requesting his presence in Chicago next week, at

Fifteen years ago the summer just passed Captain Phelps sailed the Tioga, one of the largest vessels on the lakes. With him as first mate was Captain James Jackson, of Sackets Haroor. On the occasion referred to they had just arrived in Chicago with a sarge cargo, a part of which was kerosene, but according to the statement of Captain Phelps naphtha had teen smuggled in, the barrels containing it being marked with a "B" inside of a diamond, which mark was to him unknown. Captain Phelps had just stepped off the Tioga into the warehouse where the oil was to be rolled, Laidley, D. M. Young, M. A. Carmic- Mate Jacason had gone into another gangway after a hoisting device, and a crowd of stevedores were in the hold one of them with a light when the Cream and sells for the rediculously explosion occurred.

With the explosion bodies flew in all directions. No one was injured. Every stevedore in and about the boat was killed outright, the bodies of twentyeight being picked up. So severe was the crash that the bones in their bodies were all broken. All of them wore belts and when their lifeless remains were picked up by the belts their head and heels would touch.

The Tioga was almost a total wreck It was necessary to sink her in order to put out the fire. The warehouse was wrecked and buildings for som distance around had the windows blown to atoms.

Actions were commenced against the Union Steamboat company of Buffalo, Captain Phelps was the principal witness for the defence, and not a single plaintiff was able to recover.
