"What is described in certain papers as the most virulent swine disease ever known in England is causing a panic among farmers, pig preeders and cottagers on the Isle of Elv." Miss says The London Meat Trades Journal. "Swine are being daily swept off in scores and in the neighborhood of Chatteris-in quite a small areait has claimed a hundred victims a week for the last three weeks. 
New European Horse Disease United States Consul-General Guenther, at Frankfort, Germany, advises his government of a disease which has prevalent among horses in France near the German line, known as "contagious pernicious anaemia. Profs. Vaile and Carre at Alfort have investigated this disease very thorenghly and shown by experiments that it is transmittable. It seems to be caused by minute bacilli, which cannot be distinguished at present even with the most modern technical appliances. The German foreign office called attention to the disease by cautioning against purchasing horses from the infected districts of France and the chancellor of the empire has now issued a circular to the governments of those states of Germany which are likely to import German or Belgian horses, and has called attention to the danger of introducing the disease in German territory.



Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not eserved, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family. or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.
Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is snuated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigrathe district in which the land is situate,
