ANGLO-JAPANESE SHIPOWN ING AND CARRYING CO.

Forty Steamers Will Be Taken Over-Port Arthur Will Be the Far Eastern Headquarters and Distributing Centre. London, Sept. 28.—The Standard's

Liverpool correspondent reports the formation of a big Anglo-Japanese ship-owning and carrying combination, with a capital of £5,000,000 which will take over about forty steamships varying from 2,000 to 3,000 tons each. which Japan acquired for transport work during the war, and will use them chiefly for centralizing the Japanese coasting trade. Some of them will be used for carrying shipments to and from India and China. Port Arthur will be the far castern headquarters and distributing centre. The Japanese government has granted concessions there for warehouses and docks. The combination furthermore proposes to acquire several large cargo steamers, of from 10,000 to 20,000 tons to carry freight direct between Japan, China, Liverpool, London, Antwerp, and some French ports. HEBREW NEW YEAR

The Year 5666, Begins at Sunset, Friday.

Hebrews living in Kingston will few days begin celebrating the Hebrew New Year, known to them as Rosh Hashona, or the year of 5666. According to their custom it begins at sunset Friday evening and ends at sun-

set Sunday evening. The custom of blowing the horn assemble the congregation on New Year morning is a very old one, but it is still carried out with all the ancient ceremony and precision. This year, however, it must be postponed intil Sunday morning, since Rosh Hashona falls on Saturday, the Hebrew Sabbath, when, under the law, no musical instrument may be played. When the two days of Rosh Hasis blown on each of the two mornings. Another ancient ceremony which this year will be performed on Sunday because Saturday is the Sabbath, is that of making a pilgrimage to some body of water, beside which prayers are offered for the purification of the petitioners' hearts. During the present Hebrew month, called Ellul, or Ollul, which began on August 21st, the horn is blown every morning as a daily warning of the coming of Rosh Hashona and Haseres Iomi Tshuvo (the ten days of forgiveness), which include and immediately follow the New Year's day. At the end of these ten days, during which all Hebrews are expected to pray in their synagogues, comes Yom Kippoor, the day of Atonement, when

all sins are forgiven to those who have prayerfully observed Rosh Hashona and the nine days following it. Yom Kippoor will begin at sunset on the 8th of October and end at sunset on the 9th.
