Utica, N.Y., Sept. 29.—A young and pretty Russian girl, Julia Green, until a few days ago employed as a domestic in a Carthage family, has been confined to the State hospital at Ogdensburg, having become a raving maniac while she was on her way to the church to be married.

THREW A BOMB It Exploded and Hurlled People From Beds.

New York, Sept. 29.—A bomb filled with dynamite and a quantity of inflammable oil, was thrown at the rear of a crowded five-story tenement house, at 145th street, 6th avenue to-day. Over twenty persons were hurled from their beds by the explosion, and two of them were carried from the house unconscious. Within a minute after the explosion flames had nearly enveloped the rear walls of the building. The police believe that Black Hand Italian assassins threw the bomb. The object of the attack was the rear door of an Italian barber shop on the ground floor.

WEDDED LAUNDRY GIRL. Hair to Erbach-Erbach Deprived of Right.

Berlin, Sept. 29.—The Hereditary Count Francis Von Erbach-Erbach, the twenty-two-year-old son of the head of the ancient house of Erbach, in Hesse, has been married to the daughter of a washerwoman. The marriage took place in London some weeks ago.

WANTS BIBLE EXPURGATED. Says It Is Needed for Use of Children.

New York, Sept. 29.—Rev. Dr. N. W. Rockland, of the Episcopal church of Lucknow, Ind., who is here en route to England, on a three-months' leave of absence, declares that there should be an expurgation of the Bible for certain purposes. TO FORM UNIONS. The Farmers Are to Be Brought Into Line.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 29.—A determined effort will be made on the part of the American Federation of Labor, to bring about the unionization of the farmers of this country and their affiliation with the American Federation of Labor for mutual benefit and protection. In Wisconsin and Minnesota a number of farmers unions have been formed already and according to the statement of the officials of the federation, the affiliation of these farmers' unions with the American Federation of Labor is merely a question of time. The leaders of the Federation are highly enthusiastic over the prospect of an alliance between the city wage workers, the farm hands and the farmers. It is expected that the western farmers will be well represented at the next meeting of the American Federation of Labor, which will be held in Pittsburgh in November. It is not expected that the plan of affiliation will meet with any opposition from the Federation.

LIVELY TIMES. Kosuth Calls for Union of Hungarian Parties.

Buda Pest, Sept. 29.—There is no attainment of the popular interest. The socialists gathered, last night, in front of the Imperial Club, but the police prevented disorder. Reports from the provinces show increasing support for the coalition parties. The coalition leaders realize the decided anti-vagrancy tendency of many influential persons are losing no opportunity to strengthen their positions. Francis Kosuth demands the union of all Hungarian parties. "For the defence of the Hungarian constitution," and it is believed that a private meeting of deputies, called in October for the day before the great convention, may formulate plans to secure such a union.

A WIDE SWEEP. Baku, Caucasus, Sept. 29.—With the normal ratification of peace between the Tartars and Armenians here, order in the street tram is being resumed.
