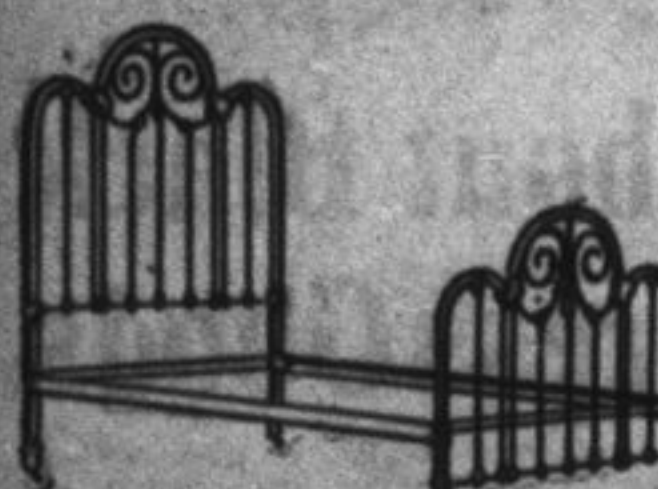

AT COOKE'S CHURCH
REV. W.S. MACTAVISH IN THE PULPIT.

To Preach Christ and Him Crucified Would Ever Be His Theme—He Made No Boast of What He Would Do, or Not Do.
Rev. W. S. MacTavish, Ph.D., the new minister of Cooke's church, occupied his pulpit at both services on Sunday, and preached to large congregations. His message was a clear and forceful preacher, who expounds the plain gospel truth, which is far more the need of to-day than the scientific and critical sermon. The way before him is bright, and he will no doubt be a power in Cooke's congregation. His morning discourse was most applicable to the beginning of his ministry in this city. To preach Christ and Him crucified, would ever be his theme in the pulpit. The text was Galatians, vi., 14, "But God forbid that I should glory save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ."

In the year A.D., 324, he said, Constantine, the Christian emperor of Rome, resolved to build a church at Calvary, the place where Jesus was crucified. But at once the question arose, How shall we find the exact spot on which the cross stood? Two hundred years before, one of the Roman emperors commissioned his servants to fill up the sepulchre to destroy every mark by which the place might be identified and to erect there on a temple to Venus and Jupiter. However, Helena, the mother of Constantine, undertook the gigantic task of discovering the exact place where the Saviour suffered. Excavations were made and eventually, a tomb was discovered in a rock, and near by it, three crosses. But the troubles of Helena and her friend were not ended, for the question arose, How can we ascertain on which of these three the Saviour died and died? MacTavish said to the occasion, A lady in Jerusalem was at the point of death. The three crosses were brought to her. She touched one, but she experienced no change, and then another but still no improvement. Finally she put her hand upon the third, and her strength was restored, her spirit revived.

This is a common tradition, but it teaches a lesson. If we today display as much enthusiasm and show as much zeal in finding out the spiritual significance of the cross of Christ as Helena and MacTavish did in finding the wooden relic, then how much more satisfactory would be the results of our efforts? And not in fancy, but in reality, would we be cured of mortal wounds and deformities which sin has made. May we today get some idea of Christ lifted up upon the cross, drawing man unto Himself, that we may be able cordially to say "God forbid that I should glory save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ. Such a view is possible, may the possible become the actual!"

What did Paul mean when he said that he gloried in the cross? Possibly he never saw a particle of the timber of the cross on which Christ was crucified; therefore he gloried not in that, but he did so, as he contrasted his present life with his past, that a great change had been experienced by him and he knew that the improvement had been brought about through his belief in the atonement of Christ.

This plan of salvation might be regarded by the Jews as a stumbling block, by the cultured, philosophic, or Greeks as foolishness; by the sturdy Romans as something contemptible; by the pleasure-loving Epicureans as a needless burden of suffering, but to Paul, it was the power of God and the wisdom of omnipotence.

And such shall be my special theme always in this pulpit. I make no boast as to what I shall do or not do, for I recall the wise advice, "Let them who are called to the ministry boast as he that putteth it off." But I do desire to preach to you Christ and Him crucified—Christ as the sinner's Substitute, as the believer's Example, as the Friend in the home and as business, as the crowning Hope of heaven.

Why should this be the keynote of all preaching? Because this note, when sounded clear and true can produce a better social order than things. The Gesta Christi—the achievements of Christ—are marvellous. Who was the means of putting an end to the terrible gladiatorial combats in Rome? Paul, a Christian. In the old Coliseum he rushed in between the combatants and fell a martyr, but the emperor was so greatly shocked that on the following day he issued an edict putting an end to the disgraceful combats. Who discovered the true system of the stars? Copernicus, a Christian. Who discovered the art of printing? Gutenberg, a Christian. Who discovered that electricity might be employed in sending messages to a distant point? Morse, a Christian. Who sent the first message? A Christian woman and the words were, "What hath God wrought." Prison reform is associated with the name of Howard, the abolition of slavery with Wilberforce; ragged schools with Guthrie—all devout followers of Christ.

Again we glory in Christ and in His finished work, as represented in the cross, because through Him man obtains redemption from sin and all its fearful consequences. Through Him men are regenerated and made new creatures. Paul himself was a conspicuous example of a man renewed, and his doubtless seen many others in his day in whose hearts and lives

THE COLLEGE HOCKEY
LAVAL UNIVERSITY ANXIOUS TO JOIN THE UNION.

Have a Good Team—Queen's and McGill Willing—The Question of Expense.
While no official request for admission to the Intercollegiate Hockey Union has yet been made, there is nevertheless good ground for the statement that Laval University will be a member of the league this winter. Laval represents the French populace of Montreal, what McGill does among the English-speaking residents. Their hockey team has been very good of late and there is a desire that what they would prescribe to all existing conditions laid down by the Intercollegiate rule book. The team practices at the Arena, which speaks volumes for its probable playing ability. Both Queen's and McGill look favorably upon the admission of Laval, but Varsity has yet to be heard from. The Toronto University management may discourage the idea, particularly on the ground that intercollegiate hockey has never paid financially at Varsity. If Laval comes into the fold, it would necessitate two trips to Montreal for the Toronto students, and corresponding increased expenditure which would not be overcome by the home gates, the money being very poor in the Queen City. However, to make matters in part at least for this difficulty, it is understood that Laval would be willing to pool the gates in Montreal and Toronto. They would even do the same with Quebec. Thus they are apparently willing to take a share of the sportsmanlike thing. Of the benefits of a four-team league there is little need to speak. So here's that Laval may this winter be found playing with Queen's, Varsity and McGill, in the good old Canadian winter game.

Queen's Track Events.
Rev. D. M. Solandt is taking an interest in the newly formed track club at Queen's and helping the boys from the start and on the cars. In reply we would say that the members of the senior and junior branches of the Y.M.C.A. have organized a "1 of 500" Club. The object of this club is to have a number of members, each contributing to five hundred. Each member on joining the club is invested with a "1 of 500" button. If the member of the club secures a new member for some time, he is entitled to a plate at the banquet which will be given in November by the Ladies' Auxiliary. Should the new member secure another new member, the first new member is entitled to a plate at the banquet, and so on. If five new 85 members are brought in by any one member he will be presented with a gold Y.M.C.A. pin and have a seat at the banquet. If ten new members are brought in, he will receive a solid gold Y.M.C.A. watch fob. Our friends should watch the names on the honor roll. The time limit is October 12th, when the special offer will close.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST.
HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS
Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not covered, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or a male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 200 acres, more or less, of the local agent for the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Commissioner of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situated, receive authority for some one to make the following claims:—
HOMESTEAD DUTIES: A settler who has been granted a residence upon the land connected therewith under one of the following provisions:—
(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.
(2) If the father (or mother, if the husband is dead) of the settler is unable to make a homestead entry upon the provisions of this Act, residence on the land for such period as a family entered for by such person as a homesteader, the requirements of this Act may be satisfied by such person residing with the settler.
(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon the land, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by the settler upon the said land.
APPLICATION FOR PATENT should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector.
When making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST.
WEST MINING REGULATIONS.
Gold-Cool lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 lbs. shall be collected on the gross output.
Quartz—A free miner's certificate is granted upon a section of 100 acres of 75.00 per annum for an individual, and from \$50 to \$100 per annum for a company according to the number of acres. A free miner, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim of 1,500 x 1,500 feet.
The fee for recording a claim is \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. If the claim has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 an acre.
The patent proceeds for the payment of a royalty of 25 per cent on the sales.
"PLACER" mining claims generally are 100 feet square, and pay \$25, renewable yearly.
Free miner may obtain two leases to prospect for gold of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior. The leases shall have a dredge in operation within one season from the date of the lease for each five miles. Rental, \$10 per annum for each mile of river issued. Royalty on the sale of the gold collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.

Power of Endurance
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Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not covered, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or a male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 200 acres, more or less, of the local agent for the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Commissioner of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situated, receive authority for some one to make the following claims:—
HOMESTEAD DUTIES: A settler who has been granted a residence upon the land connected therewith under one of the following provisions:—
(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.
(2) If the father (or mother, if the husband is dead) of the settler is unable to make a homestead entry upon the provisions of this Act, residence on the land for such period as a family entered for by such person as a homesteader, the requirements of this Act may be satisfied by such person residing with the settler.
(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon the land, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by the settler upon the said land.
APPLICATION FOR PATENT should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector.
When making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

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
