

Any even numbered section of Dominfor Lands in Manitoba or the North-west Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not eserved, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family. of one-quarter section, of 100 The Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is studeted, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigra-tion, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situate,

receive authority for some one to make entry for him. has been granted an entry for a homestead is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one the following plans : (1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.
