TO HUNT FOR POLE

APPLIED TO GOVERNMENT FOR USE OF ARCTIC.

Would Go Round Cape Horn-Government Has Other Uses for Vessel and Bold Captain's Ambition Will be Crushed. Ottawa, Oct. 2.-Capt. Bernier has applied to the minister of marine and fisheries for the use of the steamer Arctic and the necessary supplies to enable him to carry out his longcherished purpose of going to the north pole. The captain has been in Hudson Bay for the last year, serving as sailing master on board the Arctic. at Chateau Bay, on her way from northern waters. His wish is to sail around Cape liorn and strike for the polar regions by way of Behring Sea. Unfortunately though, for the execution of this bold scheme, the government has other uses for the Arctic, and according to the present programme, she is going to Sorel to be fitted with new boilers and engines. With her present machinery she can steam only four miles an hour.


