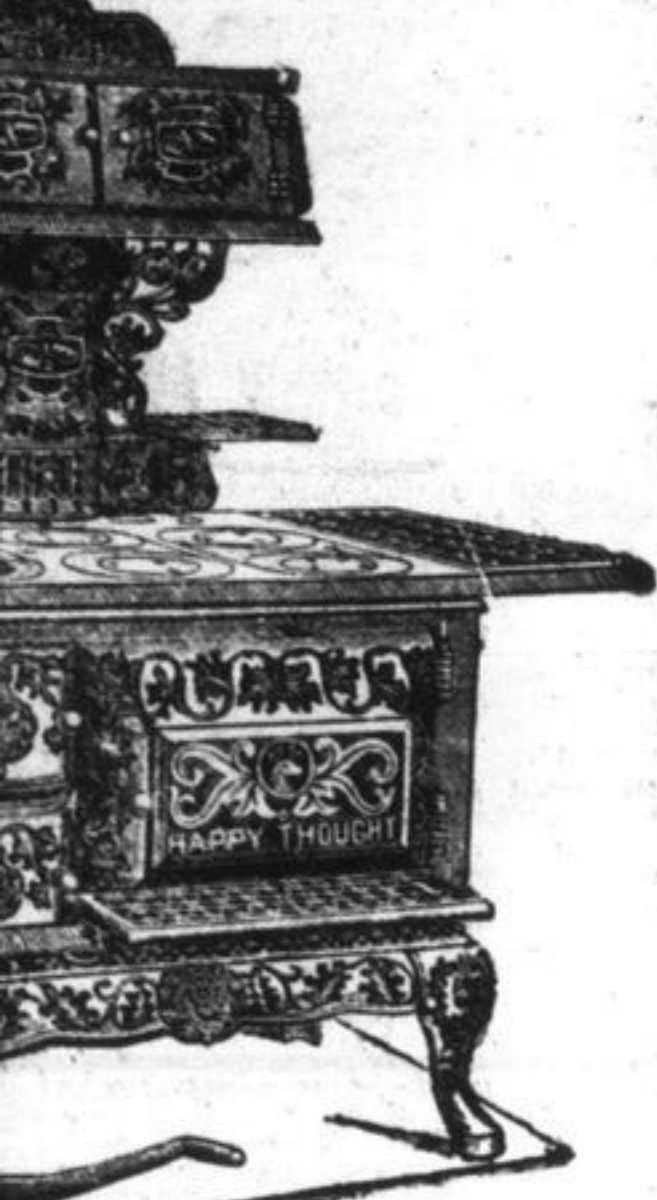




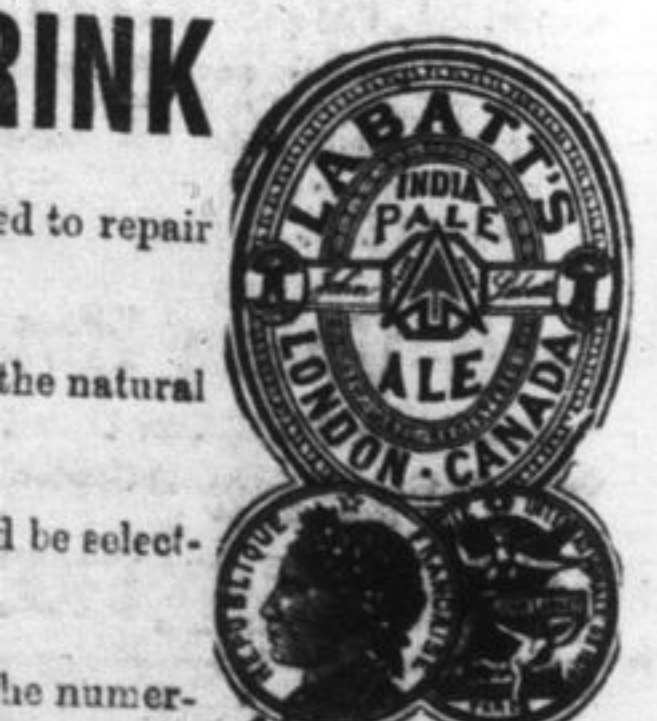

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST
HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS**

Any even numbered section of Dominion
Lands in Manitoba or the North-
west Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not
reserved, may be homesteaded upon by any
person who is the sole head of a family,
or any male over 18 years of age, to the
extent of one-quarter section, of 160
acres, more or less.
Entry may be made personally at the
local land office for the district in which
the land to be taken is situated, or if the
homesteader desires, he may, on applica-
tion to the Minister of the Interior,
Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration,
Winnipeg, or the local agent for the
district in which the land is situated,
receive authority for some one to make
entry for him.
HOMESTEAD DUTIES: A settler who
has been granted an entry for a homestead
is required to perform the following
conditions therewith under one
of the following plans:
(1) At least six months residence upon
and cultivation of the land in each year
during the term of three years.
(2) If the father or mother, if the
father is deceased, of any person who is
eligible to make a homestead entry under
the provisions of this Act, resides upon
a farm in the vicinity of the land, and
entered for by such person as a homestead,
the requirements of this Act as to residence
prior to the expiration of the term may
be satisfied by such person residing with
his father or mother.
(3) If the settler has his permanent
residence upon farming land owned by
him in the vicinity of the land, and the
requirements of this Act as to residence
may be satisfied by residence upon the
said land.
APPLICATION FOR PATENT should be
made at the end of three years, before
the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the
Homestead Inspector.
Before making application for patent
the settler must give six months' notice
in writing to the Commissioner of Domi-
nion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention
to do so.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST MINING REGULATIONS.**
Coal—Coal lands may be purchased at
\$10 per acre for not less than \$20 for
acre. Not more than 320 acres can
be acquired by one individual, except
company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents
per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected
on the 27th of October.
Quartz—A free miner's certificate is
granted upon payment in advance of
\$7.50 per annum for an individual, and
from \$50 to \$100 per annum for a com-
pany according to capital.
A free miner, having discovered mineral
in place, may locate a claim 1,500x
1,500 feet.
The fee for recording a claim is \$5.
At least \$100 must be expended on the
claim each year or paid to the mining re-
corder in lieu thereof. If \$200 has
been expended or paid, the locator may,
upon having a survey made, and upon
completing with other requirements, pur-
chase the land at \$1 an acre.
The patent provides for the payment of
a royalty of 2 1/2 per cent on the sales.
PLACER mining claims generally are
100 feet square, entry fee, 25 cents col-
lected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.

A CANNIBAL FEAST

**HELD AT MALLICLO BY THE
KANAKAS.**
Natives of Moskelyn Island Way-
laid While Trading—Miowera
Brought News From New
Hebrides—French Marines
Sent to Hunt Man-Eaters.

Victoria, B.C., Sept. 30.—News of
a cannibal feast at Malliclo was re-
ceived yesterday by the Miowera.
Two natives at Moskelyn Island
were trading when they were waylaid
near Malliclo by Kanakas. The men
were slaughtered and their bodies car-
ried to a coast village where they
were opened as game and prepared
for a feast. The bodies were placed
in a native canoe and as the murder-
ers were leaving they incurred a sus-
picion of M. Vigore, a French trad-
er. The natives told him they had
killed some pigs and the Frenchman,
believing their story, allowed them to
go. It subsequently transpired that
several tribes were assembled and a
feast of human flesh was held. White
settlers learned of this and under
pressure the natives admitted they
had roasted and devoured the bodies
of the unfortunate men.

From the New Hebrides news came
of an attack by natives upon a French
expedition sent to punish the bla-
sting for outrageous actions against white
settlers and several murders at Bul-
lies, on Malliclo Island. The French
warship Muerthe landed a party of
marines, who arrested three chiefs. As
the party took their captives from the
village a shot fired from ambush killed
one marine gunner. The party then
burned the village, dispersed the
natives and killed four men. When
they returned to the bay they were
again fired upon and a marine was
wounded.
The natives alleged that the murder-
ers of Capt. Richard Pentecost and
six members of the trader, Petrel were
taken to Noumea. They were the
ring-leaders of a party which tied
Capt. Pentecost to a tree, cast
spears into his body and while he was
still conscious they threw him into
shark-infested water and danced while
the monsters tore the body to pieces.

IT PROVED FATAL

**GIRL DIES IN THE COLLEGE
GYMNASIUM.**
Doctor Had Warned Her Not to
Take the Work—Victim had a
Weak Heart But Was Other-
wise in Good Condition.

Northampton, Mass., Oct. 3.—Miss
Margaret Dana Kelley, member of the
Roman class of Smith College, died
yesterday in a test given by Miss Au-
gusta Camp, the college physician, for
the purpose of seeing if it was prudent
for her to take part in gymnasium ex-
ercises.
The doctor did not think it best for
her to undertake gymnasium work,
but, to satisfy the girl, who was anx-
ious to have a part in the physical
training of the college, a council of
several physicians had been arranged
for and Miss Kelley was to meet them.
As the doctor was entering the office
of Miss Senda Berenson, the physical
director of the gymnasium, Miss Kel-
ley said to the physical director:
"Oh, I feel very bad. I have a weak
heart," and immediately sank to the
floor, apparently dead. It was found
that she was still breathing, but not-
withstanding the physicians did every-
thing possible to revive her, she lived
only a short time.
Miss Kelley, who was nineteen years
of age, was the picture of health when
she entered college a week ago. She
was winning in her disposition and a
brilliant pupil. So far as was known
to the college authorities, she was in
the best of health, although to her in-
timate she said she had a weak heart.
She had been nominated by her
classmates for president of the class,
and the election, which was to be held
in a few days, meant a great honor
in a class that numbers more than
350.
