



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MUMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Domin-ton Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not eserved, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family. or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on applica-tion to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situate, receive authority for some one to make

HOMESTEAD DUTIES: A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one the following plans: (1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.
(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this Act, resides

upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining natent may be satisfied by 1ch person residing with (3) If the settler has his permanent esidence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the

APPLICATION FOR PATENT should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sul-Agent or the domestead Inspector. Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention

When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, pur-chase the land at \$1 an acre. The patent provides for the payment of e royalty of 24 per cent on the sales. PLACER mining claims generally are 100 feet square; entry fee \$5, renewable A free miner may obtain two leases to dredge for gold of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior.

The lessee shall have a dredge in operation within one season from the date of the lease for each five miles. Rental. \$16 per annum for each mile of river tensed. Royalty at the rate of 24 per cent collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.






