OTTAWA COLLEGE CANNOT BREAK SABBATH.

"Hod" Stuart Barred From Even Professional Hockey—Thirty-One Teams in the O.R.F.U.—The Latest Squibs in Baseball.

Dr. Wood of Varsity, will referee the Hamilton-Guelph O.A.C. game at Hamilton, to-day.

The Philadelphia will give the Athletics \$1,000, in gold if they win the world's championship.

Edward Barrow says George Brown of New York, has developed into a wonderful ball player.

Abe Attel of California and Young Form of Philadelphia, sparred six rounds at the National A. C. Attel was outclassed by Eze.

Arthur Sexsmith has been chosen manager of the Pittsburgh team for the coming season. Sexsmith is a clever man at the game, and his selection is gratifying.

The Jockey Club of New York is looking for a starter, an associate with Maes Cassidy, the continuous strain of a long season being too much for one man. The choice seems to be limited to Jake Hoffman or Dick Dwyer.

The Victorians are confident of redeeming themselves to-day, in the return match with the Toronto Argonauts on Varsity field. Manager Slee thinks it was hard luck and lack of condition that beat the Vics last Saturday, and expects to pull out a victory.

Tommy Phillips, captain of the Kenora Thistles, is in Winnipeg on a visit. He stated that in his opinion the Thistles would be just as strong this winter as last. Tommy Hooper is expected to be back again, and will be played at cover-point, Roxy Beaudry, going to right wing.

After many days of comparative quiet at the race tracks, John A. Drake, horseman and turf plunger, has been let loose, and will be in the betting ring at Belmont Park made race-goers gasp. He picked three winners and won \$60,000.

There are now thirty-one teams operating under the Ontario Rugby Football Union—a greater number than ever before in the history of this organization. Of these, four are senior, eight intermediate, and nineteen junior. Never before have the junior clubs been so numerous.

"Doc" Gibson, the veteran player,

conceded to be without a peer on the defense, and the man who introduced hockey into copperopolis several years ago, has decided to quit the game and will not play with the Portage Lakes this winter. Of last year's team they only other players who are likely to return are Holden and Lake.

St. Patrick's had a great turnout to round into shape for Saturday's game with Rough Riders. Boucher coached the team, and all worked together splendidly. St. Patrick's will be much faster and stronger Saturday than they were when they met Montreal.

The men have the pass and run game down fine, and are also kicking cleverly. Some new men were out with the team, and most of them are doing well.

"Hod" Stuart, captain of the Calumet hockey team last winter, and who, outside of his rough tactics, is considered one of the best players who ever stepped on ice, has been debarred from the International League, and the indications are that he will quit the game for good. Stuart last season plainly evidenced his grudge against Portage Lake, and throughout the entire season was bitterly condemned for his rough tactics.

President Charles A. Comiskey, of the Chicago American League Baseball Club, is aroused over the action of the National Baseball Committee in announcing details and dates for the world's championship series. He says that the New York and Philadelphia leagues, the outcome of the American League series is settled, and announced that, as a result he would not allow his team to play in the world's championship series, whether or not it goes the way of the American League flag.

LOST HIS SWEETHEART.

Chicago Man Then Became Notorious Criminal.

Stout City, Ia., Oct. 7.—John Conway killed in the act of robbing a bank at Berkeley, Cal., Tuesday night, was one of the most remarkable criminals in America. Conway was the son of a wealthy parents in Chicago; a college graduate and a thorough good fellow. He became a criminal after seeing his sweetheart, then to be slayer by a rival and said he would die with his boots on.

He was captured here six years ago in a desperate battle with the police after holding up the Horseshoe restaurant in company with another crook. He was so well educated and refined and so entertaining that the Baptist church undertook to reform him, and one of the leading young women of the church fell in love with him. He had given up the law, but she prevailed upon him to disclose his true name. She wrote his brother, Stephen Conway, a prominent official of the Armour packing company, at Chicago, and the brother obtained his release on a bond. Conway then jumped the bond and has since pursued his career of crime.


DOCTOR NOW SOUGHT.

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 7.—Well dressed and apparently refined and well-educated, a woman giving her name as Jane Stevens, of Buffalo, N. Y., is in the county jail, charged with being drunk and having improper pictures. She was arrested in University park. The woman had in her possession a letter bearing the signature of Vice-President Fairbanks and addressed to May Wright Sewall, asking that the woman receive aid in her work.

Mrs. Stevens professes to be a worker for the upbuilding of girls all over the country for a few months at a time. She refuses absolutely to discuss her arrest or her past history and her identity is shrouded in mystery. Vice-President Fairbanks says he knows nothing about the woman's identity and does not remember that a letter was given at his office.

Big Money In Goose Raising.

H. DeCoursey, the poultry expert of Ireland, says he knows a farmer who made a profit of \$1,269 last year raising geese on a twenty-acre farm. He paid \$100 rent and food for 458 geese cost him \$310. He sold 418 young geese for \$1,554, and 650 eggs for \$277. Hay and other products of the farm brought his total receipts up to \$1,989. For the first week the goslings were fed three times a day with a mixture of equal parts oatmeal and barley meal moistened with skimmed milk. After this they were fed twice a day until a month old. Grass is the main food.
