COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

Eight and a half million bushels of this year's North-West wheat crop has so far been marketed, bringing to its owners \$6,000,000. The attorney-general has made a ruling that all new stock issues are to be taxed. This will include the new C.P.R. stock issue to come out this year. The Locomotive and Machine company, of Montreal, have closed a contract with the Canadian Pacific railway for 25 ton-wheeled freight and passenger locomotives.

August 1st, the stock transfer tax had yielded the Quebec government an average of about \$100 a day, and it is expected that when the legislature there will be a revenue of about \$100,000. The San Francisco Chronicle says there is a row of Western Pacific surveyors active in the western section of the belief of the Grand interests are planning to reach Portland and penetrate the rich Willamette valley on the way. Six Cases Off—Appointment of Judge Morrison as Local Master High Court of Prince Edward, Gazette.

The wedding was to take place next week. But Emery was not to be balked that way. According to the father's story, after hearing of the turn affairs had taken, Emery called at the Cyr house, and asked the girl to deny the rumors. Eugenie nerved herself and told the sad truth, which so affected the lover that he fell fainting at the girl's feet. When he recovered, the father says, he bravely went to despair and declared that if Eugenie married the other man he would do away with himself.

This, Cyr claims, so affected his daughter that Emery ran away, and he afterwards learned from a priest that she was being detained against her will by Emery. Then Cyr came to the city and procured a warrant. The father positively stated that the girl did not desire to marry Emery. 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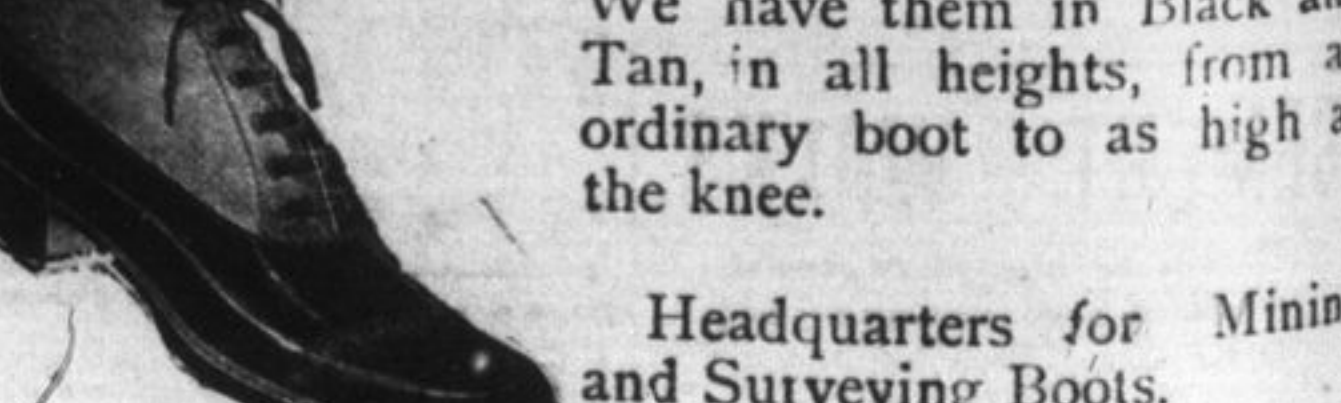
