

Moscow, Oct. 9.-The number of

There was a pitched battle between troops and strikers on the Iverskoi street boulevard. Yesterday the troops who fireed three volleys, point blank, at the people, were met by the crowd with stones and revolvers. It is impossible to estimate the casualties, as according to custom, immediately the mob was dispersed the streets were cordon ed, and the dead and wounded remov-Handsome shapes, deli- ed into yards, the gates of which were closed. It is feared that the work men, to the number of 30,000. ployed in the great factories, may ioin in the demonstration.

The populace has become exasperated, to the last degree, by a proclamation authorizing the police to seize any person they please. Any pretext is sufficient for an arrest. Af ter the fighting was over, vesterday poys and youths, men and women were dragged into the prefect's courtvard, and made to run the gauntlet of two lines of fifty men, each armed with whips, until they dropped fainting or dead. They were then picked up and removed to prison, the infirmary or mortuary. It is stated that a bomb, thrown at the game forts to preserve the old market, yesterday, killed twelve of that place.
