The Russian gunboat Taidamak, which was sunk at Port Arthur, was refloated on Saturday.

The entrance of the Grand Valley railway into Galt, will be the occasion of a celebration.

Mrs. Olive E. Odell, widow of the late George J. Odell, Watertown, N. Y., died Sunday afternoon, aged sixty-two years.

Angela May, an Italian railroad section hand, Birmingham, killed G. Angelo, a fellow countryman, who had goaded him to desperation.
