





Strange Scourge in Midland Districts of England. Pigs are dying in hundreds in the

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

even numbered section of Domin-Lands in Manitoba or the North-Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not eserved, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situated, or if the the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situated. receive authority for some one to make HOMESTEAD DUTIES : A settler wh has been granted an entry for a home stead is required to perform the con

ditions connected therewith under one

the following plans :

(1) At least six months residence upo during the term of three years. (2) If the father (or mother, if th father is deceased) of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry un der the provisions of this Act, reside upon a farm in the vicinity of the lanentered for by such person as a boine stead, the requirements of this Act as t residence prior to obtaining patent ma be satisfied by ich person residing with be father or Lother. (8) If the settler has his permanen residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, th requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the

APPLICATION FOR PATENT should be made at the end of three years, be fore the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector. Before making application for paten the settler must give six months notice in writing to the Commissioner of De minion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention
