
DRAWN UP IN FRENCH.

TO TALK IT OVER

To Go to St. Petersburg to Discuss Conditions... St. Petersburg, Oct. 12.—It is stated that Count Benckendorff, Russian ambassador to England, who is now at Copenhagen, is coming here to discuss the conditions and extent of an Anglo-Russian understanding, pour paroles towards which were opened by the British ambassador here when he handed to Foreign Minister Lambsdorff a copy of the Anglo-Japanese treaty.

A New York-Baltic Line.

New York, Oct. 12.—It is reported on good authority that Russia contemplates to establish closer commercial relations with the United States and that the Russian department of merchant marine is considering a plan for the establishment of a direct steamer line plying between New York and some Baltic port, either Riga or Libau.

And Still They Come.

New York, Oct. 12.—All records for the month of September were broken last month in the matter of the number of immigrants who entered the United States through the port of New York according to the immigration report just given out by Commissioner Waterborn. During the month of September 90,772 immigrants landed at Ellis Island, against 82,706 during the corresponding month of last year.

Found Precious Stones.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Oct. 12.—It is claimed by prospectors that diamonds and garnets have been found a few miles north of this city. Considerable excitement prevails as a result. Exploring parties are being organized to search Algoma district for gems. The geological department of Ontario also, it is stated, will take up the investigation.

Is Out for a Decreased Rate of Taxation... Ottawa, Oct. 12.—Owing to increase of five millions in assessment, under the new act, Mayor Wise is out for a decreased rate of taxation, and declares the next campaign will be waged on that issue.

A DISMEMBERED BODY.

Parts Found in Rooms Through the House... New York, Oct. 12.—The dismembered body of a man was found in a house at 145 Third avenue, the head in one room and the body in another. Frederick Bauer, a German, who was seen early to-day coming from a room where parts of the body were found, has been arrested as a suspicious person. He gives his occupation as an elevator runner.

THE BUSY GREEKS.

Bring Death to the Village of Ernitsany... Vienna, Oct. 18.—According to advices the Bulgarian village of Ernitsany, near Monastir, was attacked by a Greek band and many of the inhabitants were killed. Greeks set fire to several houses and a number of children perished in the flames.

To Regulate Sale.

Bracebridge, Ont., Oct. 12.—The town council has passed a by-law to regulate the sale of cigarettes. The license fee is \$100. The sale of cigarettes would have been made prohibitory, by high license, but for the fact that the hotels and licensed liquor shops are exempt from any fee.

British Ship Ashore.

Gibraltar, Oct. 12.—The British repair ship, Assistance, is ashore in Tetune Bay, Morocco warships, steam cranes and lighters have gone from here to her aid. A heavy gale endangered the vessel. The Assistance carries a crew of 262 men and mounts ten three-pounder quick-firing guns.

To Let Assembly Act.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 12.—Emperor Nicholas has decided to turn over to the national assembly the final settlement of the question of the abolition of the restrictions on Jews being admitted to the universities with other general legislation relative to the status of the Jews.

Must Not Interfere.

Chicago, Oct. 12.—Judge Holden has granted an injunction restraining Typographical Union No. 16, and its members from interfering with employees of members of the Chicago Typothetae against whom a strike has been declared by the Printers' Union.

Will Add \$10,000,000 To Debt.

Ottawa, Oct. 12.—It is said that the government is seriously contemplating assuming control of the port of Montreal, which will mean an addition of \$10,000,000 more to the debt of the country. The idea is to make Montreal a free port.

Persian Lamb Jackets.
