SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

ton Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not eserved, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 100 Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which

the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situate, receive authority for some one to make HOMESTEAD DUTIES : A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one the following plans: (1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.
(2) If the father (or mother, if the

Of the natives the major says that tain there are four tribes on the west tide of the Hudson Bay, viz: Kenee-patoos, Ivilieks, Netchilieks and Igulicks. "Of these the first two are the most civilized and the best workers. The rising generation is not so much imbued with the superstitions of the race and if taken in hand by the government as the Indians have been, am convinced these superstitions would be cradicated. As a rule they are good

"I would take four or five of the head men south in the fall with good interpreter they know and trust and show them some of the comforts of civilization. Allow them to spend the winter and part of the summer in the North-West Territories. They could return to the north on the supply vessel. I believe that in this way many of them could be induced to go to the Territories as settlers. If located on some large river or lake where they would have boating and fishing, they should make good set tlers. If properly handled they could be induced to cultivate fields and raise stock, By the removal of some in this way game would increase and living would be made easier for those re

The major suggests providing hospital facilities for the natives at Ful-

He makes an interesting suggestion respecting trading with the natives. 'In a previous report I suggested that no traders should be allowed in the country but that every police post should be a trading station where the natives could dispose of their furs; that boats and whaling geer be supplied reliable native crews to be paid for out of the proceeds of their hunting in instalments. Fair prices should be paid for what they have to sell and no one but the police should be allowed to deal with the natives in any way. All goods purchased should be annually sent south and disposed of. By this method the natives would learn to realize that the police were the power in the land and that only to them could they look for pro-

Possibly she might be delayed somewhat by ice if the wind had been continuous from the northdanger. Everything depends upon what the prevailing winds have been and last year is but little guide to this. In my opinion and that of good men le with whom I have consulted the south side of the strait is best for steamers coming in. For sailing ships the north de is generally preferred.
