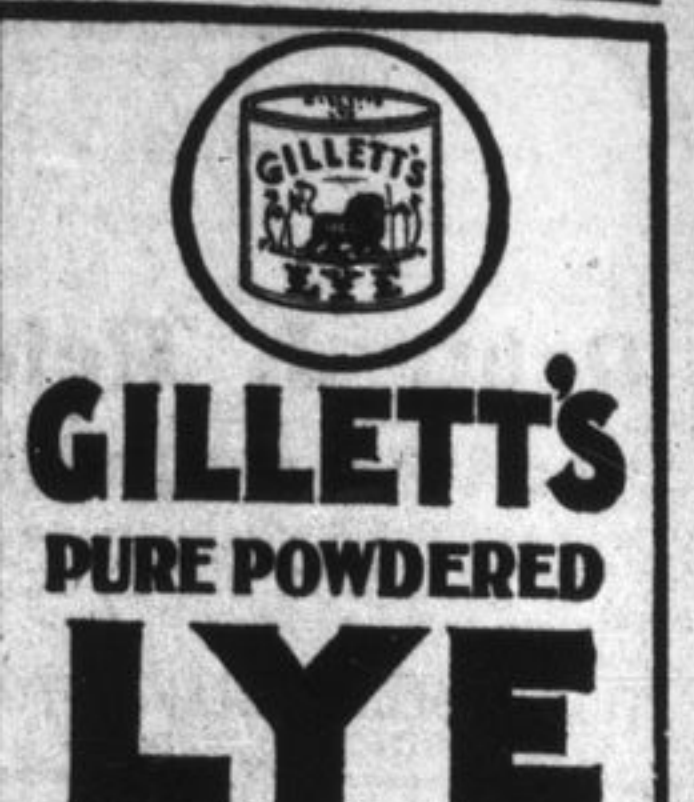

OCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody -Notes From All Over-Little Of Everything Easily Read And Remembered. William Ince, of Perkins, Ince & Co., the oldest wholesaler in Toronto, is dead.

An imperial ukaz authorizes the use of the Polish language in the private schools of Poland. Forty warships are now assembled at Yokohama, for the great Japanese naval review on Monday.

The Prince of Wales, who is journeying to India for a six months' tour, arrived at Genoa yesterday.

Astronomers are watching with interest a newly appeared spot on the sun. Its area is estimated at 13,000,000 square miles.

Burglars in Coaticook, Que., blew open a safe in the office of Mr. Guerin, who runs a store and creamery, and got away with a considerable sum of money.

At the investigation into the Toronto electric scandal, George Puddy admitted paying G. P. Elliott \$700 to canvass manufacturers and influence a decision if he could.

R. P. Campbell of the interior department has been promoted to the mines and timbers branch, in place of G. W. Ryley, who has entered the services of the Grand Trunk Pacific.

The Pacific directors will meet October 25th to authorize a \$25,000,000 mortgage on the property. The Western Pacific is the projected Gould road from Salt Lake to the Pacific.

The marine department was advised that the steamship Alvin A. Turner, owned by C. McLean, East Saginaw, has been sunk in the Little Detroit Channel, on the north shore of the Georgian Bay, entirely blocking navigation.

TRAFALGAR DAY

Celebrated with Enthusiasm in the Empire. London, Oct. 21.—Trafalgar day was celebrated to-day, with the customary enthusiasm in all parts of the kingdom and everywhere in the colonies. The day has become the greatest and most generally observed anniversary day of the English nation. Nelson's column in Trafalgar Square was profusely decorated with wreaths of flowers and thousands visited the monument to pay their respects to the memory of England's greatest naval hero. As usual the Navy League sent a magnificent floral tribute of large dimensions, tied with the French and Spanish colors. There was a big gathering with addresses in Albert Hall in the afternoon, and a grand evening concert in commemoration of the day. In Liverpool and many other cities there were civic parades and patriotic celebrations. The day was also observed with elaborate ceremonies in all the British colonies.

Montreal's Tribute. Montreal, Que., Oct. 21.—Trafalgar day is celebrated here, to-day, by many of the patriotic societies and the principal features of the day will be the memorial concert at the Y.M.C.A. auditorium, to-night, under the auspices of the Sons of England. The Rev. H. Jekill will deliver an address.

Winnipeg's Celebration. Winnipeg, Oct. 21.—Under the auspices of the various lodges of the Sons of England, Trafalgar day will be celebrated here, to-night, by a large concert. Prof. Bland and Mrs. Stanford Evans will deliver patriotic addresses.

Boston Keeps The Day. Boston, Mass., Oct. 21.—The one-hundredth anniversary of the battle of Trafalgar and the death of Admiral Nelson, the greatest naval hero in England's history, will be celebrated here, to-day, by the English residents and patriotic order of the Sons of England by a grand memorial concert which will be given to-night under the auspices of the Victorian Club of Boston. The celebration will be held at Tremont Temple, which has been beautifully and appropriately decorated for the occasion. Capt. Alfred F. Mahan, U.S.N., retired, will be the principal speaker and Commander Takeshita, the Japanese naval attaché, Admiral Sir H. Edward Seymour, R.N., who came from England for the purpose of attending this celebration, and Sir Henry Mortimer Durand, the British ambassador, will also deliver short addresses. The rest of the programme will include instrumental and chorus numbers.
