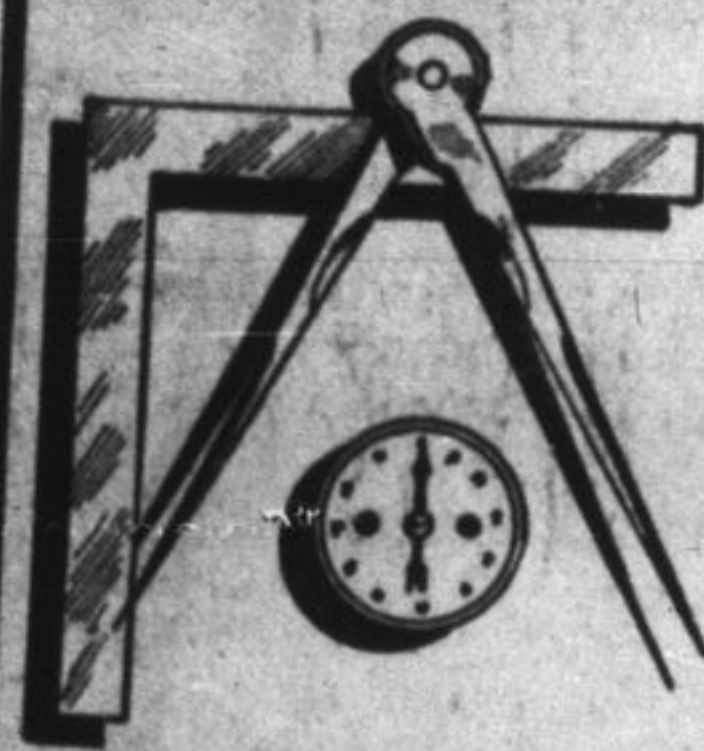

NEWS OF CHURCHES

THE VARIOUS DOINGS IN THE RELIGIOUS WORLD.

More Churches Than Any Other Country.—To Help Balking Booth—Dr. Hillis Returned From Tour.

Evangelists will shortly commence a new campaign. The Lord is not a refuge for the man who is looking for a soft place to rest.

Rev. Frank W. Gonsaulus, D.D., has recently been chosen to a chair in Chicago Theological Seminary.

At Berkswell, England, a saddle-topped stool used by an old-time fox-hunting parson, unable to preach unless astride a saddle.

Dr. John Watson closed his twenty-five years' ministry at Selton Park Presbyterian church, Liverpool, on Sunday, October 15th.

Rev. Dr. Burton, of Banbury, England, has offered in connection with the Trafalgar celebrations, to marry with-out fees on October 21st.

The proprietors of Hymns Ancient and Modern have issued a pamphlet replying to criticisms on the new edition and explaining changes.

As the parish church is several miles away, the congregation of the Dorset hamlet of Holworth celebrated their harvest festival in the kitchen at a cottage.

Mrs. Ignatius Williams, of Heddregheld has been appointed churchwarden of the parish of Vyvseych-hairn, in succession to her late husband.

Many Baptists in England and Amer-ica will regret to hear of the death of the pastor of Grove chapel, Cam-burwell, Thomas Bradbury. He had been pastor of the church for more than thirty years, and was held in high esteem.

Bereto Church, Cheshire, England, has been restored. Built in 1450, it was noted for magnificent carved oak panels and ceiling, but from ravages of the oak beetle has become unsafe. At a cost of £2,000 the ceiling has been replaced by a facsimile.

A saddening report is that of the death of Rev. George Crook, of the cathedral, Balis, Honduras, only two years out from England. The yellow fever has swept over whole communi-ties. His wife and nurse also died and left two little children.

The Laos Christians at Chieng Mai, Siam, recently indulged in a unique charity. One hundred and fifty lepers were gathered on an island south of the city, and feasted bountifully. Then each was given the dishes used, new cloth and Christian books.

Officials, concerned about the long drought in the Taiyuanfu district, China, have visited every shrine and prayed at every temple; they have hatched some images for negligence, and others have been put out in the sun to make them feel dry. It is said that a number of wealthy men in Chi-cago, New York, and Boston have offered to assist Ballington Booth in a proposition to purchase 102,000 acres of land somewhere in the south and colonize it with workmen from the large cities.

A movement, headed by the mayor of Winchester, England is on foot in that old Saxon capital for the restora-tion, preservation and enclosure of the remains of the ancient Abbey of Hyde, the burial place of King Alfred and Queen Elfrida, and his son, King Edward the Elder.

A stained glass window has been placed in Caunton Church, Notting-hamshire, as a memorial to the late Dean Hole and his thirty-seven years' vicarage there. The window is in the central light. "The Dean and his successors as the rose," is the inscription. The church was despoiled for the altar and the communion service lost. Late-ly at a race meeting in Wales was offered the chalice, which had been brought across the sea, as a prize. It was won by a Newport gentleman, who asked the rector of South Brent to ac-cept it.

The parish church of Skegby, Notts, now undergoing extensive restoration, has been ruined by the workings of a local coal mine. The pit workings pass underneath the church at a depth of 400 to 500 feet below the surface, and the settlement of the ground has caused the tower and body of the church to subside, the former to the extent of six inches.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any unimproved section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 3 and 20, not served, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situated, or by mail, by depositing the application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situated, to receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

HOMESTEAD DUTIES: A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under the following plans: (1) At least his residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

WEST MINING REGULATIONS. Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal at \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual, or company, or partnership. The rate of tax for a ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.

A free miner's certificate is granted upon payment in advance of \$7.50 per annum in advance of a royalty according to the output. A free miner, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,500x1,500 feet.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining re-binder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended on a claim, the holder may have a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 an acre.

The patent provides for the payment of a royalty of 24 per cent on the net output of a miner of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the holder. The interior of the lease shall have a drainage in operation for each year from the date of the lease for each five miles of river issued. Royalty at the rate of \$1 per acre shall be collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.
