WIDE POWER Given De Witte, Who is Russia's Premier. THE CHIEF INTERESTS OF THE PEOPLE ARE DAILY FOOD AND LIGHT.

Whole of Russia in Wild Whirl, No Head, No Centre, No Definite Trend - Elementary Forces Clash and War.

Paris, Oct. 27.-The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Temps writes that Count De Witte has been appointed premier, with very wide powers. The premier has called a council of ministers, and will promulgate immediately laws granting liberty of the press and freedom of assembly.

Russia in Wild Whirl. London, Oct. 27.-A St. Petersburg despatch to the Exchange Telegraph company says it is authoritative that the emperor has decided to grant a constitution similar to Germany's. The conference of ministers decided, yesterday, to grant the economic, but to refuse all the political demands of the people, except freedom of the press.

The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Telegraph says the Russian people are in full revolution, and are standing face to face with the bourgeoisie, in a struggle unmeasured and incalculable. The ranks of the people's army are swelled daily by myriads of recruits. They are beginning to feel their gigantic strength, and are anxious to witness the overthrow of the entire nation is wildly whirling round and forward in eccentric circles, of which no man can tell which represents the leading movement.

Warnings Issued. St. Petersburg, Oct. 27.-Warnings to the people, that in case of disorder the soldiers will fire at rioters, are posted on every street corner to-day. The city is outwardly calmer.

THREE MEN KILLED By Bank of Earth Falling on Them.

Coatlock, Que., Oct. 27.-Three men named Joseph Rockney, Jean Richard and St. Cyr were instantly killed, yesterday afternoon, at five o'clock, in the gravel pit belonging to the corporation. It seems that Rockney and Richard were working in the pit and had excavated a hole about ten feet below the surface. St. Cyr, who was an insurance agent for the Metropolitan, called on the men while at work. The men were talking when the overlying bank gave way, precipitating about twenty tons of coarse gravel on them and burying them completely. They were dug out in about an hour's time, but life was terribly mangled. All of them, were married men and leave large families.

STATUE OF VON MOLTKE Unveiled in Berlin, by Emperor William.

Berlin, Oct. 27.-Emperor William, yesterday, in the presence of all the great personages of state, and many thousands of people, unveiled the statue of Field Marshal Count Von Moltke, the gift of the army to the German people. It was the 105th anniversary of Von Moltke's birthday. Subsequently the kaiser gave a banquet in honor of the memories of his grandfather and uncle, Von Moltke, he said: "My second glass is for the future and the present. You have seen, gentlemen, how we stand in the world. Then, powder dry, sword keen, eyes on the goal, march, halt, and away with persisters. I empty my glass to our people in arms, the German army and the general staff. Hurrah!"

RAILWAY BRIDGE DESTROYED Gossacks Attack Workmen and Many Are Injured.

London, Oct. 27.-A despatch from St. Petersburg says that two squadrons of Gossacks attacked 7,000 workmen who were holding a meeting at the Nevski square, about an hundred workmen, it is reported, were wounded, and seven Gossacks injured by stones. The railway bridge, across the Obvodny canal, at St. Petersburg, has been destroyed.

A Wild Rancher. Chicago, Oct. 27.-A Muelder ranch owner from Nevada, attempted to give away \$6,351 in front of the Palmyra Hotel. He threw the money on the sidewalk, and called out, "Will you take it?" "Yes, I will," said Police-man Peterson, as he picked up the money and seized Muelder, believing he had in custody one of the men who robbed the Indians. Muelder told the police that he had disposed of several carloads of cattle at the stockyards. He then left the place and went out for a drink. The prisoner was unable to tell the police where he had been subsequently.

Detroit, Mich., Oct. 27.-A Houghton, Mich., despatch says that the International Hockey League season opens on December 11th, the Canadian Soo playing at Cabnet and on the following evening the American Soo opens the season in Pittsburgh. THE CIVIC INVESTIGATION

In Toronto, Reaches An Uninteresting Stage.

Toronto, Oct. 27.-Very little of interest transpired in the civic investigation. The proceedings are apparently dragging somewhat, and there is a general opinion that the taking of evidence will conclude to-morrow.

Investigator, Alderman Dr. Lynd is the chief witness waiting on the list for examination. George F. Scott, secretary-treasurer of the North-West Ratepayers' Association, resumed his evidence, this morning, and said that Dr. Lynd gave the association the impression, in January last, he was with the association, and conveyed no intimation, subsequently, that he had changed his mind. After the vote, Alderman Lynd told him that he could not help himself. Mr. Scott volunteered the statement that he had expressed the belief that when the investigation closed Dr. Lynd would come out of it with honor. Alderman Graham told of overhearing the remark, in council, that unfair means had been used to obtain the vote on the Paddy permit.

LEADER KILLS CHINESE. Uses Death as Lesson Against Yellow Peril.

Victoria, B.C., Oct. 27.-The steamer Moana brought news from Wellington, N.Z., of the murder of an old Chinaman by Lionel Terry, an English agitator who has lectured and worked in the United States, particularly on the Pacific coast.

Terry, before surrendering to the police, wrote to Lord Dunsford, governor of the colony, stating he had killed the Chinese as a protest against alien immigration. After a lecture upon the need for the preservation of the Anglo-Saxon race with Terry, the Chinese quarter of Wellington and killed the first Chinese he met by shooting him.

Terry was educated at Oxford and had served in the garrison artillery and British Horse Guards. He served in the Jamson raid and Matabele war.

A LOAD LINE Should Be Established By Government.

Detroit, Mich., Oct. 27.-The Seamen's Union will take up the question of overloading and will bring it before government officials. "Overloading this season has been the cause of a number of our members drowning like rats," says Local Agent Sealton of the Seamen's Union. "The union will take up the matter and get up a petition to the government asking that the matter be taken up. The government ought to establish a load line."

QUANTITIES OF GRAIN Transported From West-And More in Store.

Winnipeg, Oct. 27.-Canadian Northern railway has, up to date, transported 4,750,000 bushels of grain, east of Winnipeg, and has now in store, in her elevators, 2,200,000 bushels, making altogether with what is now in transit, over 7,000,000 bushels taken from the farmers' hands. All the wheat received, all along the company's lines, was graded No. 1 and No. 2 Northern.

Will Study Occultism. Chicago, Oct. 27.-If the plans of Mrs. Charles F. Joy, wife of former Congressman Joy, St. Louis, are carried out, a \$1,000,000 university, of which the object will be the study of occult and psychic phenomena, the human soul and all the arts and sciences of the "new thought" not recognized by established schools, will be built.

Seven Lost At Sea. Victoria, B.C., Oct. 27.-The Sydney liner Droghda Moana is found to have been lost off New Zealand on September 20th, and her crew of seven was drowned. Those lost were: Capt. Edward Jones, Mate F. C. Johnson, Cook H. C. Bathurst, and four seamen.

Joseph Morel's Suicide. Quebec, Oct. 27.-Joseph Morel, a laborer, with a wife and four children living at Lake Edward, took poison yesterday, presumably with suicidal intent, and died some hours later in great agony.
