SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominton Laads in Manitoba or the Nortiwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not eserved, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is savuated, or if the

homestender desires, he may, on applica-Ottawn, the Commissioner of Immigra-tion, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situate, receive authority for some one to make HOMESTEAD DUTIES : A settler who has been granted an entry for a home tead is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one the following plans : (1) At least six months residence upon

and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.
(2) If the father (or mother, if the ther is deceased) of any person who is ligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this Act, resides apon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by ksuch person as a homestead, the requirements of this Act as to esidence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by ich person residing with


